




The summer of 2007 has flown by and there have been a number of developments. We received feedback on our Five Year Report to NEASC, our accrediting Our accreditation has agency. been continued and we received a dozen new commendations. you probably know, we received numerous commendations in the Two Year Report. Preparations for the next ten-year accreditation process will begin with a report due on March 1, 2009.

We have several new or returning members on our faculty this year. Heather Galante takes over for Dean Bernie Battle in Whittier House. Stephanie Pally and Margaret Tantraporn have joined the Social Studies Department. The Foreign Language Department has added Myrna Watkins to teach Latin and Leticia Dominquez-Tapia as a part-time Spanish teacher. Sharon Charbonnier is the new Foreign Language Department Head. Karen Blagg and Zachary McIntyre have joined the Mathematics Department. Marian Smith will replace Sue Gauthier as our Reading teacher. Terry Karangioze transferred from Parker to fill a new art position. Glynnis Perruccio will take over for Joan Monahan in Special Education. Ian Van Blarcom joins the English Department and Abby Saarinen returns to the Science Department.

The Class of 2011 had an exciting start at CHS. On Wednesday, August 29th, there was a "Kick Off" orientation program. Students met peer mentors, toured the building, received some introductory information, learned a "freshman dance" and received a gift bag that included a class shirt, a daily planner, a key chain and a variety of school supplies. Parents were briefed and saw their students perform in the new auditorium between 8 and 9 p.m. During the school year, students will formally meet with their assigned mentor 3-4 times and can contact them for information or assistance as needed.

On Thursday, August 30th, a fall sports orientation was held in Conrad Gym. Parents packed one side and fall athletes packed the other. Opening remarks were made by Superintendent Donald Yeoman, Principal Allen Thomas, Athletic Director Jack Fletcher, and Booster Club President Allan Marsh. Tom Hermanowski made a presentation entitled "It's Your Team, It's Your

CHSAA'S CAPITAL BUILDING CAMPAIGN

"If you build it, he will come," a voice whispers from an Iowa cornfield to Kevin Costner's Ray Kinsella character in the baseball movie classic Field of Dreams.

George Simonian, executive director of the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association, hears similar voices. Simonian, who founded the organization 18 years ago, says the group needs to grow to endure – to attract new members. A sure-fire way of doing that, he and many other alumni believe, is to build a permanent home for the association, a Chelmsford High Alumni Hall, if you will.

In Field of Dreams, of course, Kinsella builds a baseball diamond on his farmland, and through an artfully filmed cinematic masterpiece, he's reunited with his long-departed dad, a former ballplayer, with some help from the ghosts of baseball past.

Simonian doesn't have any spirits he can conjure up help from on this one, but he has assembled a team – leaders in the association – who are stepping up to the plate.

"Wouldn't it be something, a public high school alumni hall?" my former CHS principal muses of his idea to give the group a place to call home. "Chelmsford High School is running out of room. We've got to preserve what we have," he says, referring not only to overflowing trophy cases acknowledging student academic and athletic achievement but records as well.

But first things first, says association President Terry McSheehy, Class of '64. If we raise the money, then we'll build it.

And so with the Board of Directors blessing this September began a \$5-million capital fundraising campaign.

Simonian says \$3 million would go toward building and endowing future operating expenses for the 8,500-square-foot building on a little more than 2 acres located on Richardson Road, nestled between the front and rear driveways to CHS. Another million would endow the organization, ensuring its future, enabling the association to routinely mail all graduates – not just members - all alumni news, including copies of the Lion's Pride. It would also eliminate the need to collect dues from members. The last million would endow a paid executive director and secretary, both most likely part-time positions for which salaries have yet to be discussed at any length, but ones which would oversee the entire alumni operation, from running the building, to coordinating scholarships, even organizing and running reunions, Simonian says.

"It's very important in our estimation to give tangibility to the alumni association," McSheehy says. "The younger generation doesn't seem to be joiners. Having a building to drive by will help make that connection."

The planned one-story building (plus basement) overlooking the CHS track would have a function hall designed to comfortably entertain close to 200 people, making it available for many reunions, social gatherings on homecoming weekend and such. A draft design, donated by an alumnus, calls for a long central aisle filled with display cases for trophies, awards and other CHS memorabilia., a rotunda

in the main foyer, meeting space, a library, offices and a sizable basement area in which not only alumni association records could be stored, but School Department and historical town records as well, Simonian says. The function space would enable CHS to hold some of its awards night events there as well.

The organization wants the building to be used, so a couple hundred parking spaces would be part of any plan submitted to the town for approval. Town Meeting voted last spring to transfer ownership of the parcel from the schools to the town of Chelmsford, thereby enabling a building plan to follow the normal channels, Simonian says. Now the town (representatives at the meeting seemed quite receptive to the idea since no taxpayer dollars would be used) is waiting for the group to raise the necessary funds.

The first step in that process is raising \$50,000 in "seed money" to hire a professional fundraiser, says Denise Marcaurelle ('76), a regional manager for Enterprise Bank who is chairing the capital fundraising drive. "We're putting our heads together, trying to train people in how to go out" and raise money. The fundraising group plans to leave no stone unturned in its quest, targeting corporate donations, small businesses, professionals and other individuals with deep pockets who believe in the cause.

"It's an awesome idea," says
Marcaurelle. "Kids who get out of
college will come back. You'll be
amazed at how many kids come back
to this area.... Hopefully we'll get the
building up in George's lifetime."

Everyone does, especially Simonian. If everything, from fundraising to building plans, goes smoothly, he's hoping to see a structure in "a couple of years."

McSheehy believes the capital campaign itself could take anywhere from 12 to 24 months, with the building constructed within a 3-5-year time frame, "depending upon when we hit the magic number. We have to feel comfortable the money is there."

Simonian has talked about the building concept for years, according to association co-founder Bill Keohane ('74), a firefighter in town. Some alumni have had "mixed emotions" over the need for such a building, but this year most felt the time was right. Over the years, the group would "have space, then lose space" to meet at CHS, because the school itself is cramped, even with the recent addition.

Al Thomas, CHS' current principal, agrees. "We don't have a lot of room in the high school," says Thomas, appreciative of members' suggestions to use the new building, in part, to give CHS off-site space for seminars, and enrichment activities, such as writing or teacher workshops. And the building could prove an invaluable repository for all sorts of good stuff, he says.

"Keeping the history of the organization is really important," Thomas says. Over the summer, Thomas came across graduation programs for CHS dating back to 1928. "Preserving things like that are really important. They need to be preserved for the history of the town and community." And the alumni could use a place to gather, to reminisce, as well as plan for future generations of CHS grads.


That's the dream in Simonian's field of vision, one shared by many in the organization.


Keohane is as effusive as Simonian when he ponders the big-picture possibilities for Alumni Hall.

"When people see a building it gives it permanence and prominence," says Keohane. "It's better than seeing (Chelmsford High Alumni Association) on a letterhead. It would give us tremendous impact," he notes, saying students and parents would see it on their way to and from games at Simonian Stadium and CHS' other nearby athletic fields.

Though he certainly supports the move, Keohane admits he hasn't had a major role in the recent push for the building plan. "I'm a great farmer. I fertilize the field and hope the hell it grows," he says. "George has been the farmer tilling the soil." No matter what, says Keohane, the organization can and will survive. But making Simonian's dream become a reality "would be fantastic. It would cement us fundamentally into the town's psyche.

"It would be the whipped cream on the hot-fudge sundae," says Keohane. "But we've got a mountain to climb."

Performance, It's Your Decision" to help set a good tone for the fall. Finally, parents and athletes met with the coaches to hear plans for the season. The event went well and will be continued in the future.

We have tried to spruce up our facility. Our kitchen was painted by prisoners through Sheriff James DiPaola's "Community Work Program." Our custodial staff has worked hard to do the floors, tear out the carrels in Whittier House, and other projects. The maintenance staff painted the front doors and a new sign was placed above the doors. We visited several companies to get chairs, tables, desks and files to replace some that were very old and worn. Please note the improvements in the Main Conference Room, the Faculty Dining Room and the Ladies Room in the Main Office.

Our Alumni Association has voted to undertake a \$5 million fundraising campaign to financially secure the operation of the association and to build an alumni house at the end of our driveway on the Parker side of our building. Their scholarship endowment has passed the \$1 million mark and they gave about sixty-five scholarships to members of the Class of 2007 and to alumni graduate students.

A handbook containing guidelines for use of the new Performing Arts Center has been developed. Groups wanting to use either the new Performing Arts Center at the high school or the auditorium at McCarthy Middle School need to submit a "Use of Facility Form" at least a week before the event. These forms may be obtained from the main office of all Chelmsford School District Schools, Central Administration, from the office of the Auditorium Manager, or on the Chelmsford Public School website (www.chelmsford.k12.ma.us).

We are off to a good start in the classrooms, on the athletic playing fields and in our wide variety of activities. As most know, Money Magazine named Chelmsford the 21st best place in the U.S.A. in which to live. We will work hard to remain a top school in a top community.





SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS NIGHT

George Simonian is quite fond of noted philosopher and humanitarian Albert Schweitzer.

"You make a living with what you get, but you make a life with what you give," Schweitzer once said.

Simonian, executive director of the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association says he's been preaching that message to students for years. In fact, giving back was the cornerstone of his commencement address to CHS' Class of 2005.

To say he knows the subject pretty well would be a gross understatement. Under his direction, the association has given out \$262,175 in scholarships to deserving students since the spring of 1993. The first scholarship ever awarded was \$350 given out in the name of the now late town historian George Parkhurst, who came up with the idea to endow a scholarship fund for Chelmsford High graduates.

"You've gotta give back, and what a way to give back," Simonian says of the scholarship fund, which now boasts an endowment of more than \$1 million.

Before recipients and their families munched on fresh fruit, cheese and crackers and sweet treats at the most recent scholarship awards night May 14 at CHS Conrad Gymnasium, the association distributed \$47,150 in 81 separate awards to deserving students, ranging from single awards of \$250 to \$4,000 prizes, some of which are renewable for a student's full four-year college commitment if he or she maintains good grades.

The criteria for the scholarships run the gamut, from students who plan to play football while in college, to those who plan to major in science, business or other specific majors. And the prizes come from all walks of life as well, from CHS grads who have achieved great success and want to give back or others who have been touched by their experience with the school community. Any family, individual or organization can

establish a scholarship to recognize a person or group by donating a minimum of \$5,000 to the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association Endowment Fund. The donation becomes the principal of that individual award. Annual awards are paid with money raised from the interest.

CHS Principal Al Thomas says some of the groups who endow the various scholarships are hoping to increase their awards, acknowledging the skyrocketing cost of a college education in the 21st century. Some are hoping to provide more money for graduate students, as well, he says.

While the awards can't come close to paying the complete cost of attending college, students are nonetheless appreciative.

"Anything helps," says Gregory MacDonald ('07), who plans to major in business this fall at Bryant University in Rhode Island. "It's nice to be recognized," says one of two winners of the Murray B. Hicks Memorial Scholarship last May.

MacDonald, an Eagle Scout who ran cross country and track at CHS, says the money will "take some of the burden off" buying things like books and accessories for his college dormitory.

Albert Lin, Class of 2004, and winner of the renewable Hall of Fame scholarship, agrees. "It gives you a little extra" for food "and books and stuff," says Lin, a senior biology major at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, who plans to pursue a graduate degree there as well with a veterinary medicine focus. "Every little bit counts, especially when you're a student."

Lots of students could use that extra, says Simonian, which is why the scholarships are so important.

"Wouldn't it be nice to give every kid who graduates something?" Simonian says.





Dear classmates: Our class is on the move! As you can see from the above address, I have moved. Alone. Without Pete. Peter died on June 22, 2007, of heart failure. For fifty-three years Peter and I lived at 232 Dunstable Road, in a ranch-style home which I designed and which he built, where we brought up our children, and from where we spent twentyseven years in retirement, six months of each year in Florida. When it was suggested to Peter that he move to Chelmsford Crossings with me, he said, "I'm not leaving this house," so we spent his remaining days there.

The lives of Shirley and Edgar, and Peter and I, have run parallel in many respects. Pete and I both retired in 1981 and have spent six months of every twenty-seven years since then

After Peter died on June 22, I moved into Chelmsford Crossings, an assisted living facility. I know what Edgar means when he says he eats at the same time every day. I also head for the dining room about the same time three times a day, where all my meals are provided. Every Tuesday someone washes my bed linens and remakes my bed. At times I walk to the end of the corridor to join in with the Bingo players, or join the knitting and crocheting group. There's also a

Sunday "singing hymns" group, and the showing of the Red Sox games on a 60"TV screen in the living room. We can also be driven in a van to our medical appointments or to the store, or to lunch at Markey's or some other restaurant, or to a movie. Sometimes I play cards. Other times I stay in my one-bedroom apartment and stay lazy. I took with me my 37"TV and my Bose radio. I'm still driving and go to Dunstable Road almost every day to clear out our home of fifty-three years in preparation to sell it, with the help of our son, Bob.

Is anyone else in our class on the move? Call me, email me, or let me know. We can form our own club to console each other, or to inspire other. We'll be each other's morale booster. I'll be waiting to hear from you. Affectionately, Dot LeClaire Mackey
