The Marble Collection is a nonprofit publisher of the *Massachusetts High School Magazine of the Arts*. The Marble Collection honors, yearly, an Outstanding Art Educator Award for visual arts. This year's recipient is one of Chelmsford High School's own, Ms. Terry Karangioze. Ms. Karangioze teaches studio art and art appreciation. She developed an innovative art curriculum and is committed to helping students showcase their creative work in gallery exhibitions and competitions. As a testament to her skills, Ms. Karangioze had five students whose work was selected to be published in the magazine's latest edition. If you ever get a chance to see this magazine, after looking at the art work inside, you will fully understand why this is such a great accomplishment for both the



students and teachers. We are so proud of our art department.

Our DECA advisors, Andy Shupe and Tom Sousa, led our team to national success. Our students earned recognition at the International DECA conference held in Anaheim, CA last April. Jill also earned two first place medallions for the comprehensive exam and her first role play event. This was Jill's 2nd time as an International finalist.

Seniors Jack O'Neill and Brian Tong were recognized at the same conference for their work in the Restaurant & Food Service Management Series event and the Principles of Finance Event. Each of the categories listed above take a great deal of time, planning and execution to make their projects become a success. Congratulations to the students and DECA advisors.

UMass Lowell hosted twenty-one high school teachers from around the world. Each teacher was paired with high school teacher in this region. Chelmsford High School was one of the communities participating with UMass Lowell in this venture.

The program is called Teaching Excellence and Achievement Program (TEA). It is an intensive six-week program that includes field experience in local schools and two events for the campus community. Teachers involved in this program get an amazing opportunity to develop expertise in a particular subject.

Field experiences are designed to establish lasting professional relationships between local teachers and their counterparts from around the world. They share best practices in education while building cultural understandings. Our staff and students loved this exchange of ideas and hope to be part of future partnerships.

As we end this school year, I look forward to bigger and better opportunities next year and I am even more hopeful about Chelmsford's leaders for the next 100 years.

SHAILYN FARMER

SENIOR Profile ▶ By Fanny Riand *Class of 2018*



“Art enables us to find ourselves and lose ourselves at the same time.” This paradoxical definition of art by Thomas Merton could not be more accurate. It is what makes art so truly unique. Chelmsford High School senior Shailyn Farmer would know. Shailyn has been avidly sketching and doodling away since she could hold a pencil, evolving from drawing Pokémon to dragons to realistic animals, and she’s not about to stop.

It’s hard to find anyone more dedicated to her work than Shailyn. She loves the challenge that comes with the trade, and the satisfaction of completing high-quality artwork after innumerable hours and effort. On top of her responsibilities in the LIME club (Leadership in Motion Everywhere) and softball, Shailyn’s passion for art keeps her extremely busy, both inside of school and out. In school, Shailyn has taken literally every art class available: ranging from Studios 1, 2, and 3, to Honors Art Portfolio and Advanced Placement Art, to 3D Design and Animation, as well as multiple independent studies. Thanks to these classes and her teachers, Shailyn has gained crucial exposure to animation, and has been able to expand her skillset greatly as she gears up for college.

Outside of school, Shailyn does even more. She has been published in the popular teen art magazine *The Marble Collection* twice, has been selected to be displayed at the Massachusetts Statehouse, and has won a Gold Key for her artwork from this year’s Boston Globe Scholastic Art and Writing Awards—none of which are easy feats. On top of these accomplishments, she has designed the logo for the publication company *Illuminated Myth Publishing*, created

the cover for the book series *Meridian James* by Rebs Kendry, and was even asked to make posters for the nearby McCarthy Middle School Library. The old phrase “practice makes perfect” takes on new meaning with Shailyn, who makes it her goal to draw every day. It’s no wonder, then, that her art has received such notable recognition.

Shailyn’s talents are impressively varied. Not only has she mastered the traditional arts, including mediums such as graphite, acrylics, and watercolor, but she can also produce magical works digitally. She started out on her digital journey in 6th grade with just good old GIMP and a computer mouse, and has grown tremendously since then, currently making professional-looking pieces using Photoshop and a Wacom Intuos 4 drawing tablet (a significant upgrade from the mouse). When asked which she prefers, traditional or digital art, Shailyn pondered thoughtfully that each has its own purpose. Traditional art is ideal for sketching, as drawing on real paper lets her brainstorm freely and wherever desired. Digital art, on the other hand, is especially useful for her final pieces, offering an abundance of tools to edit color and lighting.

Even the most talented artists come across obstacles, however. To Shailyn, the hardest part of being an artist is “really committing to it 100%, and doing all the practice and research you need to do before you tackle a piece. It’s so easy to just dive into an illustration without much planning. That can lead to a whole bunch of errors in a drawing.” Good art takes more than mindless skill—as Shailyn expressed, it’s also largely about the thinking and planning ahead, and not overlooking even the painstaking and minute details. In fact, Shailyn’s exceptional attention to detail is a great part of what

makes her art so special. Throughout her vast body of artwork, that determination to ‘get it just right’ is clear and unmistakable in every piece.

In the last few years, Shailyn has become remarkably active on social media, using it to share her art with the world and stay inspired by other gifted artists. She mostly uses DeviantArt (an online artwork-sharing platform) and Instagram, both under the username ‘16Shards.’ In addition, she has her very own website. She created it herself in early 2015 using a website builder, and turned to other artists’ sites for ideas when deciding on the layout and content. Although she updates it less frequently than her DeviantArt or Instagram, she has effectively utilized it as an ‘online portfolio’ during the college application process. Shailyn has also used her artistic presence online to open up paid commissions in the past. She has been commissioned several times by online users so far, even having some of her artwork end up in South Africa! Due to the time-consuming nature of commissions, Shailyn is taking a break from them for now, but hopes to resume them in the near future.

This fall, Shailyn will be attending the Ringling College of Art and Design in Florida, where she plans to major in Computer Animation. She chose Ringling because it’s one of the top animation schools in the nation, especially in 3D animation. Her decision was also heavily influenced by her time spent at Ringling last summer, where she participated in their precollege program and even finished in the top 10% academically. Her experience was “nothing but positive” and is what really sold her on the school in the end. Not only did she feel challenged, she felt she was learning from professors with real ties to the animation industry (including a former anima-

tor at Pixar!) Furthermore, Shailyn knew that staying in the Northeast would make it difficult for her to find jobs in the industry later on, since the region is lacking in high-quality animation programs. Shailyn thus justified her college choice, smiling, “it’s not just for the Florida weather.”

In college, Shailyn seeks to continue improving her skills overall and keep pushing herself to try new things. She has decided to pursue Computer Animation for this exact reason: although it remains fairly new and unfamiliar to her, it is also incredibly fascinating and full of potential. Shailyn is the sole artist of a math and science-based family, yet her parents have been very supportive of her art-career dreams; and Shailyn has shown great motivation on her part, undeterred by all the difficulties of the profession and unknown territory lying ahead. Shailyn wishes most to truly bring art to life with her work. “I hope people are able to connect with the art, and feel its emotion,” she explained. These are without a doubt ambitious goals, but there is likewise no trace of doubt in anyone’s mind that Shailyn is well on track to reach them.

Chelmsford Public Schools *Department of Athletics*

This past winter was another very successful season for CHS Athletic Department. We had almost 400 student athletes participating and competing in 12 Varsity Sports, 11 sub varsity programs and a Sports Medicine student-training program. Individually and collectively our athletes achieved great success, the Varsity Teams had an overall record of 64-62-8.

Our Gymnastics Team won the MVC Regular Season and the MVC Championship Meet!

The Boys Swim and Dive Team won the MVC Championship Meet and finished 2nd in the Div. 1 State Meet, finishing as the top Public School in the State. A special congrats goes to the 200 Medley Relay Team of Aaron Zhu, Noah Johnson, Ben Cote and David Cote on winning the Div. 1 State Title.

Our Wrestling Team won their 15th MVC Championship and its 11th MIAA Div. 1 North Sectional Championship in school history. They almost pulled off the repeat at the State Tournament but just missed, finishing 2nd in the Div. 1 States.

Individually we had 23 All-Conference selections and 18 All-Star Selections. Two of our Student Athletes won individual state titles. In wrestling, Joe Vecchione won the Div. 1 State Championship at 170 lbs and in Indoor Track, Kristin Hohenstein won the Div. 1 State Championship in the 55 Meter Hurdles.

For the **fifth consecutive year**, the NAMM Foundation has recognized the Chelmsford Public Schools for its outstanding commitment to music education with a Best Communities for Music Education (BCME) designation! In its 18th year, Best Communities for Music Education (BCME) affirms school districts that have demonstrated exceptional efforts toward maintaining music education as part of the schools' core curriculum. **Chelmsford is one of 4% of districts across the nation receiving the prestigious award in 2017.** The Chelmsford Public School Music Programs play a vital role in our community, and are attractive to families looking to move to a district that excels not only in math, reading, and science, but also in the Fine Arts. The announcement

of this year's Best Communities for Music Education designation brings attention to the importance of keeping music education part of school's core education and music's fundamental role in student success in school.



On November 19, over 1100 music students from public and private schools across the Northeastern part of Massachusetts auditioned for the 2017 Northeast Senior District Music Ensembles. Out of this group, approximately 450 students from grades nine through twelve were selected to participate in this prestigious Massachusetts Music Educators Association (MMEA) event, 15 of which were from Chelmsford High School. These students performed for a concert at UMass Lowell's Durgin Hall on Saturday, January 14.

In addition to having these 15 students accepted into Senior Districts, students who received a score in the top 50% of their area were eligible to audition for the MMEA All-State Ensembles. This year, nine band, chorus, and orchestra students received an All-State recommendation, and three students from the CHS Ensembles were selected to represent Chelmsford at the All-State Festival!

Those students selected for the All-State Ensembles stayed in Boston March 9-11 to work with world-renowned conductors. After a few intense days of rehearsal, the ensembles performed at Symphony

Special thanks to Chelmsford Friends of Music; this organization generously covers registration fees of students participating in the Junior District, Senior District, and All State Festivals.

The Massachusetts Instrumental and Choral Conductors Association (MICCA) Solo and Ensemble Festival took place in May at Concord Carlisle High School, and the CHS Treble Choir, directed by Amanda Roeder, was awarded a Gold Medal at this event!

The CHS Treble Choir, composed of auditioned students in grades 9-12, prepared two pieces for the festival: "Weep No More" by David Childs and "How Can I Keep From Singing?" arranged by Rollo Dilworth.

This was the second MICCA Gold Medal awarded to CPS ensembles this year; earlier this spring at the Concert Festival, the McCarthy Band also received Gold, and the CHS Band and the All-Town Wind Ensemble were each awarded a Silver for their performance.

In other music news, this year the CHS a cappella ensemble "The Thursdays" advanced to the final round of the International Championship of High School A Cappella, more commonly referred

to as ICHSA. The Thursdays placed first in the semi-final round, and were one of only a handful of high school a cappella groups from across North America to qualify for the finals. The ICHSA finals were held at the Town Hall Theater, 123 West 43rd St. in New York City, on Friday April 21. The students in The Thursdays were thrilled to participate in this event, says Amanda Roeder, CHS Choral Director: "I'm particularly proud of the way this year's group coalesced around their competition set. The students chose three songs that highlight themes of division, isolation, and unity. They feel a deep connection with the music, and it is incredibly gratifying to watch them bring their message to an increasingly wider audience."

Finally, I am pleased to share that many of our CHS Band students will once again perform at national venues next year! The Chelmsford All Town Wind Ensemble (ATWE) is comprised of approximately 60 volunteer student musicians in grades 5 through 12 from the McCarthy Middle School, Parker Middle School, and Chelmsford High School Band Programs. This ensemble will once again perform *The Star Spangled Banner* for the Red Sox game on September 29!

In addition to their upcoming Fenway performance, ATWE has been accepted to perform at the **National Band and Orchestra Festival at Carnegie Hall in New York City** in 2018! This was the result of a successful video audition and approved ensemble resume and application. Carnegie Hall is one of the most prestigious venues in the United States, and this will truly be a

major life experience for our student musicians.

The festival takes place between March 29th and April 1, 2018. Students in the ensemble will prepare a program and perform for a group of clinicians that includes four major United States conductors: Frank Battisti, Craig Kirchoff, Charles Peltz, and H. Robert Reynolds. The clinicians will then lead a clinic/workshop for ATWE that will allow the students and directors to gain valuable insight and future advice for performances of their program.

"To receive professional feedback from artists of this caliber while playing on one of the most famous stages in the world is an opportunity many musicians will never experience in a lifetime of work. As directors, we will appreciate every second as we help our students to understand how truly unique all of this is," states ATWE Co-Director, Sean Wright.

Bravo to the CPS Music Faculty for their dedication and successes this year!

In spring theater news, the CHS Theater Department thrilled crowds with their original competition play, *Family Album*. On Saturday March 4, the Chelmsford High School Theater Guild hosted the preliminary round of the Massachusetts Educational Theater Guild (METG) Drama Festival for the sixth consecutive year under the direction of Lauren Cochran and Craig Roberston, This is the 86th year that the METG produced its annual Drama Festival.

At this event, Chelmsford High School was one of eight

schools performing one-act plays judged by a panel of adjudicators. The preliminary round kicked off with 112 schools performing in several locations throughout the state, each of which presented a 40-minute play. Three schools from each site were chosen to advance to the semi-final round. Finally, selected schools progressed to the State Finals, which were held at the John Hancock Hall in Boston the weekend of March 30-April 1.

This year, the CHS entry to the Festival was entitled *Family Album*. *Family Album* is an original comedy about a family's antics at their summer cottage in Bristol, New Hampshire. The play was conceived and written by Eloise Hoffman and students at CHS. In addition to being one of the winners of the semi-final round, CHS students earned several awards: Will Marcotte and Jonathan Puffer both won All Star Acting Awards, the costume crew of Cassidy Boucher, Anna Drake, Lila Gordon, Alexa Tanzer, Melissa Contover, Kate Heineman, and Kasey Corbett also won an award, and finally, Kamran Sobhian won an All Star award for original music composition.



FINE & PERFORMING ARTS *Report*

Each year for the past five years, CHS students have created portraits for disenfranchised children around the world as part of “The Memory Project,” and this year, 18 CHS Art Students participated in this endeavor. The students, led by art teacher Teresa Karangioze, created portraits for children living in Ukrainian orphanage. Approximately 120 CHS students have participated in this program over the past five years.

CHS Student artwork was also featured at many local and state exhibits and competitions, including the Westford Regional Art Event, an annual juried art show for adults, young adults and children, and the Massachusetts Art Education Association (MAEA) Exhibit at the State Transportation Building in Boston. The MAEA exhibit runs in conjunction with Youth Art Month, a national celebration that emphasizes the value of art education for all children and encourages support for quality art programs in Massachusetts’ schools.

Art students from Chelmsford High School, Parker and McCarthy Middle Schools in Chelmsford again earned awards at the Boston Globe-Scholastic Art Awards this year! Since 1923, The Scholastic Art Awards have offered millions of students the opportunity to display their art works for regional and national recognition. The objective of the program is to foster the confidence of young artists and to invite students to broaden their horizons while winning national recognition. The Scholastic Art and Writing Awards are the largest and longest running programs of their kind in the country.

HALL OF FAME *Review*

27th Annual Hall of Fame Induction

A Night Of Giving Thanks

Gratitude. It comes in many forms, and many were on display March 25 at the Radisson Hotel in Nashua, as the Chelmsford High School Alumni Association inducted nine more incredible people at its 27th Hall of Fame ceremony.

More than 300 alums, past inductees and family members dined on some tasty chicken, rice and asparagus before being wowed by the accomplishments of the honorees.

In his opening remarks, CHSAA Executive Director George Simonian, who was marking his 60th year of involvement with the Chelmsford schools, noted that the inductees came from all walks of life and included those who have succeeded in their community, school and/or careers.

"This will be an evening that will surprise and please you, as it always does me," CHSAA President Terry McSheehy said. "I'm always inspired and humbled by depth and breadth of their (inductees') credentials. They are fine examples of the success of Chelmsford High School."

McSheehy also gave a plug to CHSalumni.org, the association's

interactive website, largely a success through the efforts of Bob Pariseau and Steve Normandin, as well as Project Share, an innovation being spearheaded by CHSAA board Vice President Dennis Hunt which is designed to pair CHS students with alums who help with careers and college choices.

CHS Principal Stephen Murray, Class of 1988, looked around the room and mused, "I think we'll have a lot of fun in the next five hours," poking fun at the often lengthy acceptance speeches.

Murray expressed his gratitude that the Chelmsford schools were blessed with a strong administration team who "all help CHS thrive" -- athletic, academics and arts -- and helped the school maintain Level I status.

Students taking AP courses scored 10 percent higher than the state average, Murray noted. The CHS gymnastics team won the MVC, while wrestlers took their 15th MVC championship, and second in the state. "They are an unbelievable machine. I don't think (coach) Bruce Rich has a losing season."

Murray also pointed out CHS art students were participating in a "memory project" for kids in Ukraine orphanages. And the Theater Guild was in award finals three years in a row. The CHS Band performed at Gillette Stadium and Fenway Park, he added.

"It's so rare to have a high school so balanced... it's what makes it such a great place to work," Murray said.

"I'm proud to be part of that."

And now for our inductees.



ROBERT F. BROWN JR., CLASS OF 1981

In introducing Robert F. Brown Jr., Simonian called him an "outstanding multiple sport athlete, football, a Blue-chip All American," who played in three post-season bowls for the University of Pittsburgh football team, which he attended on a full scholarship, majoring in business management. Brown not only excelled on the gridiron as a lineman while at CHS, but also played basketball, baseball, wrestled and was a member of the track team.

Brown is also a highly successful businessman, helping to provide infrastructure to communities and businesses across New England. In 1998, he co-founded Waveguide, a fiber optic telecommunications contractor in Nashua, which was recognized by INC Magazine as one of its fastest-growing companies in the nation.

In addition to helping countless charities across the region, Brown has also volunteered time, equipment and materials for local youth groups, everything from replacing lighting on youth sports fields to laying fiber optic cables at Simonian Alumni Stadium.

As he opened his induction speech, the former Lion football co-captain couldn't help but take a few shots at longtime CHS rival Billerica, where his father is enshrined in their Hall of Fame.

Although he said his father was a larger-than-life individual, "he was reduced to tears during his own induction into the Billerica High School Hall of Fame... His picture still hangs next to the gymnasium in Billerica High and he's revered to this day for graduating with fewer than 5 felonies."

"I'm truly privileged to be included with this assortment of doctors, entertainers, philanthropists, educators, athletes and yes, at least one radio personality.... However undeserving his entry might be. I know (Gerry) Callahan makes his living being outspoken and controversial, but seriously."

He then poked fun at Callahan for shattering his dreams in the 1978 Super Bowl at BU when a touchdown punt return was called back for a clipping call on Callahan.

But he transitioned to note that "the people of this town have always been able to deal with adversity. We persevere, we adapt, we re-define ourselves and we work hard," Brown said. "We're not whiners, we're not quitters We're winners. We are this way because of each other. We are this way because of our parents, our teachers, our coaches or our

church. We are this way because we have each other's back."

Brown then thanked numerous individuals for having his back: Chuck Cook, Mike Baraldi, Bruce Rich, Jack Fletcher and Tom Caito. "These men did more than teach me a sport - they taught me to be a man," he said.

"Mr. Simonian, Ed Quinn, Don Boucher, Jeff Doherty, Al Thomas, Bernie Battle, Ed Carpenter, Donna Foley and Dick McCaffrey were all amazing educators. In fact, if it weren't for Mr. McCaffrey I wouldn't have made it through college calculus. He would tutor me over the phone 600 miles away 2 to 3 nights a week. I'm forever grateful. Because I use calculus so often now."



LINDA KRASNECKI
CHEMALY, Class of 1971

Simonian noted that inductee Linda Krasnecki Chemaly helped her parents publish the Newsweekly newspaper for many years, but was even more well known for being a "giver-back," a fine "young lady," he called her, as well as the "epitome of giving back."

Chemaly took her business skills, honed at one of the first businesses run by a woman at Faneuil Hall, Van

Dyke Shoe Shine Stand, and at the Newsweekly, and unleashed them on a lengthy career of philanthropic endeavors. She has received numerous awards in the Merrimack Valley, from the Bishop John R. McNamara Award for outstanding contributions to the Catholic community, to the American Red Cross' Donna and Elkin McCallum Humanitarian Award. She has also contributed time and money to numerous nonprofit endeavors across the region, serving on many boards of directors along the way.

"Did you hear him call me young lady? I love him," Chemaly said, looking appreciatively toward Simonian.

After congratulating her fellow inductees, Chemaly thanked longtime classmate Barbara Maynard Scollan, Class of 71, for nominating her.

"We've known each other since kindergarten, but it wasn't until the first day of school in 6th grade when she asked to sit next me on the bus that we became the best of friends."

Chemaly said she was grateful to receive so many well wishes on her nomination.

"It's pretty cool when you get a note from one of your teachers from high school congratulating you," she said, referring to former teacher and later Dean Ed Quinn.

Chemaly also had plenty of thanks for her family, especially "my dear husband, John, one of best things to come up out of Tewksbury High Class of 72. Happy birthday to him," she said.

"When I was in high school, if someone had said to me that one

day I would be standing up here at the Hall of Fame, not once, but twice (her mother was inducted four years ago) I would have said 'you are crazy.' "But life is mysterious and one never knows."

"I was selected not because I invented Post-its, but for the philanthropy work I do across the Merrimack Valley," she related.

While she and her husband have given to capital campaigns and high-profile organizations, she said her favorite type of contributions are those that are anonymous.

"It's when we can help someone who has fallen on hard times, give someone a hot meal, or pay a bill, or a course or some schooling," she said.

As a former board member for the House of Hope shelter in Lowell, Chemaly learned one of their guests had a bachelor's degree, had kids, worked hard, but "how was she to know her husband would become an alcoholic, would beat her up and that her children would be put in a very dangerous situation," she said. "The rug can be pulled out from underneath anyone."

"So this is where John and I choose to give, and why John and I give."



LORI CIOLETTI EWELL,
CLASS OF 1975

Lori Cioletti Ewell was inducted

for her award-winning, 33 years in research and development of new and existing food products. A Math and Science Club member at CHS, Ewell earned a bachelor's in microbiology and a master's in food science from Oklahoma State. The rest, as they say, is history. She's spearheaded numerous product quality controls, from development of specific Weight Watchers yogurts and other dairy products to Smart Ones to Budget Gourmet.

Today, she is director of research and development of Michael Angelo's Gourmet Foods of Austin, Texas. When she's not making our food safer and better, Ewell donates her time and efforts to many local civic organizations, such as Kutz for Kids and the local food bank.

"Good evening folks, how are y'all," Ewell began her speech in her adopted Texas twang.

"I can turn it on or off, but it's good to be home... really proud to be here, it's a big surprise," she said of her induction.

"I go about my life kind of looking toward the future and I just keep moving forward... through the good times of life, the birth of son, a marriage, and hard times -- loss of a parent, or loss of a job. During this time you're building your life resume and your work resume and not really thinking about it."

After her brother nominated her for induction, "it stopped me in my tracks," she said. "I've never stopped to think about anything I've done... It made me stop and think about all the people who have been in my life and to be really thankful for them," Ewell said. "And not just your family and friends, because they're so obvious, right?"

"It was the less obvious. Family, of course, but also teachers, administrators, your principal,

(putting hand on Simonian's shoulder," coaches, "those people who were just around you, maybe kicked you in the butt and said, 'don't have fear, keep moving forward.

"I want to thank the people in this room and those who supported the nomination and helped bring me back to Chelmsford and just tell everyone to keep moving forward, but don't forget to look back because there's an awful lot to be thankful for."



MICHAEL FLANAGAN,
CLASS OF 1990

Michael Flanagan was nominated for a lifetime of inspiration, from his athleticism as a lineman for the CHS and Holy Cross football teams, to his pursuit of excellence as an educator. He began his career as a history teacher at Bishop Manogue High. A host of positions later, from teaching at McCarthy Middle School to Merrimack College, North Middlesex High, to name a few, Flanagan is presently the superintendent of schools in Tyngsboro.

In addition to his professional and athletic accomplishments, Flanagan has led the Connor Flanagan Foundation, created in honor of the doctors, nurses and families who became caretakers of his son, Connor, when he was diagnosed with leukemia and was a patient at Children's Hospital in Boston

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in 2005 and 2012. The foundation supports pediatric oncology patients and families at Children's, providing everything from pizza parties to meals to games and toys.

"It was great to listen to Steve Murray talk about the successes of CHS and I am always impressed when you can hear an educator speak with passion and conviction about their kids and school community," Flanagan said. "It affirms my belief that the best teachers were called to their profession.

"I truly believe that I was called to public education because of my experiences as a student and the relationships I developed with teachers in the Chelmsford Public Schools..." he continued. "In addition to my teachers, I have had tremendous coaches in my life who also influenced me. Beginning in my youth with a man who epitomizes what youth coaching SHOULD be. I am proud and honored to say that I had the opportunity to play baseball for 6 years for "Papa Lou" Robillard, a man who had his priorities in order and wanted to win, but never at the expense of kids having fun.

"CHS athletes were spoiled in the late 1980's... because we had some of the greatest coaches and mentors in the state," he said. "To be able to say that I played for Tom Caito, Bill Christman, Jack Lang, Jack Fletcher, Bruce Rich, Bob Pariseau and Jim Durkin... It's just incredible, I learned so much from these men."

Flanagan met his wife, Jennifer, while supervisor of students at McCarthy School where she was a sixth-grade teacher who eventually said yes to a date.

In August 1997, two weeks after their honeymoon, at her

encouragement, Flanagan interviewed for a social studies position at Tyngsboro High with Principal Larry Kelleher.

"Larry wanted someone that could coach, advise, volunteer and connect with students beyond the classroom," Flanagan recalled. "Essentially, everything I felt about CHS is what he was looking for in a new teacher."

He's now been with the Tyngsboro schools two decades.

He also shared the spotlight with his children.

"Mollie Flanagan is an 8th grade honor student at Tyngsboro Middle School who was a Midland Wachusett all league cross country runner for Keith O'Brien (CHS Hall of Famer 2015) this past fall, and a basketball and lacrosse player, who will be attending Tyngsboro High School next year."

He called his son, Connor, "a rock star, strongest kid I've met in my life" for having "endured, battled and beaten..." leukemia. "Connor, you are an inspiration for me every day buddy."

Connor, 18, will graduate from Tyngsboro High in June and attend Westfield State University in the fall.

"For the past 12 years, my family has been the nucleus behind TEAM CONNOR. Jennifer and I have committed our professional life to working with kids, and our goal through this organization is to make life a little better once a week for kids and families battling cancer, so that they can experience some normalcy," he said.

"Final Message: Thank you to all of the educators and coaches in the room tonight, though your results

may not be immediate, the work that you do is vital and impactful."



GOLDEN LION, TRINITY EMS

President McSheehy presented the Lucy Simonian Golden Lion Award to John Chemaly, CEO of Trinity EMS, which has supported CHS sports teams with EMTs, financially, through the mock accident program during prom and graduation season, 24-hour relay, after-prom breakfasts, and the list goes on and on.

"Well, well, well. This must be the Easter season cuz miracles never cease," Chemaly said. "A Tewksbury kid gets honored by Chelmsford High. Thanks for this great honor. This just doesn't happen with me," he added, thanking his employees, family, and three or four tables of friends "supporting Lindy and myself. You guys could have been somewhere else but you're here."

"Thanks Paul Cohen and selectmen, for continuing to choose Trinity to be your ambulance service," Chemaly said. "We have a wonderful 911 system here in Chelmsford, second to none. It is a model, but along with everything else, the biggest thrill tonight is sharing the stage with my wife, because all the stuff you've mentioned wouldn't happen

without Linda. She's my teammate. This award weighs a ton. It'll take two of us to lift it up. Thank you."



HENRICK R. JOHNSON, JR., CLASS OF 1966

Henrick R. "Rowie" Johnson Jr. was inducted for his many years of public service to his hometown. Before all of that, Johnson was a member of the CHS Student Council, Leaders Club and the CHS basketball team that won conference and the Class C. Tech Tourney at Boston Garden.

His public service began with a six-year stint on the Industrial Development Financing Committee, where he transitioned to an 11-year run on the Planning Board where he was elected chairman five straight years. During this tenure the town saw major growth – over 5 million square feet of industrial and office space, which he helped shepherd. He also served six years as a member of the Board of Selectmen where he helped oversee the opening of the new Senior Center, and the defeat of a proposed trash-to-energy facility near the Lowell landfill, which would have greatly impacted North Chelmsford and the Westlands neighborhoods.

Johnson opened with a fond recollection of finally making the varsity basketball team his senior year on one of the best teams in the state.

"But make no mistake; I was the

12th man on a 12-man team," Johnson said. "Early in the year after having a particularly bad practice, Coach Henry McCarthy called me into his office. 'Johnson,' (he said) I don't know why I keep you on the Varsity; there's one J.V. better than you."

"I looked him in the eye and said, 'you're wrong Coach; there are 2 J.V.s better than me'!! With that I got the coach to smile and if you knew Coach McCarthy, in his mind IF he was smiling, he was laughing out loud!"

Johnson said the town has meant a lot to his family. "My mother's parents, Hans and Dorothea Hansen, and my father's parents, Henrick and Betty Johnson, all came to Chelmsford over 100 years ago. Collectively they raised 6 children who all graduated from Chelmsford High School between the years 1935 to 1942. "My mother, Dot, graduated in 1940 and she used to love to tell me that even though I moved to Chelmsford when I was 6 days old, in her eyes I was not a "true-Towney!" You see, she was born in the family home in 1922."

Johnson noted his father, Del, Class of 1939, was a Hall of Famer and considered one of the finest Chelmsford athletes of his generation.

Johnson made special mention of his two best friends: his son, Rick, and wife Donna.

"My son, Rick, is a hard worker, a great athlete, but most importantly a really good guy," Johnson said.

He recalled meeting Donna at a dance class at the Center School.

"She was going to the McFarlin School and I was going to the Westlands School," he said, noting that when she returned

to Chelmsford more than 30 years ago, she became embedded in town organizations, ranging from the Holiday Prelude Committee to Friends of the Senior Center and more.

"No one loves Chelmsford more than Donna," he said.

When people ask where he's from, Johnson said he tells them: "Chelmsford, the BEST TOWN IN AMERICA!"



DENNIS F. KING II, CLASS OF 1983

The newest member of the Chelmsford School Committee has spent a lifetime pursuing excellence in education, from graduating in the top 20 students from a class of 650 to graduating Cum Laude from Boston University as a biology major. King took his wrestling skills honed in high school to BU where he was a three-time New England Collegiate Tournament finalist and a 1987 Academic All American. He did his student teaching at CHS where he served as assistant wrestling coach to Bruce Rich and helped them to the Division I state title his last year. After 12 years teaching biology in Methuen, he moved to Central Catholic in Lawrence to help launch a new wrestling program where he went on to lead them to numerous state and sectional titles.

King opened with a joke, noting he

was being inducted the same night as his neighbor, Bob Brown. He was excited and nervous, he said.

“I was excited because this is such a great honor, but I was nervous that during pictures someone might mistake us for Arnold Schwarzenegger and Danny DeVito from the movie *Twins*,” he said.

“When I first sat down to write this speech I tried to think about all the people who have helped get me to this night. Of course there are my terrific parents, Dennis and Anne King, who had the foresight to move to Chelmsford 40 years ago and who brought me and my siblings up to understand that the best way to achieve your goals was to work hard and maintain a positive attitude,” King said. “Then there are my great kids Maggie, Abbie and DJ who have all taught me lessons about the importance of patience, perseverance, fun and love. ...

“There are also those people who have inspired or guided me toward certain aspects of my life,” he said. “There was the middle school biology teacher (Dennis Hunt) who sparked a love of science in me and showed me how teaching could be a great way of making a living. There was the 24 year old phys. Ed teacher (Bruce Rich) who introduced me to the sport of wrestling and began what has now been a 38 year career as a competitor and a coach. There was the mentor teacher (Mike Tate) back when I was doing my student teaching at Chelmsford High School who showed me how to work with other teachers in my department in my role as department chair. And recently there have been the veteran School Committee members (Al Thomas and Angie Taranto) who have helped educate

me on what it is like to serve.

“What do all these people have in common besides serving as role models for me as I’ve gone through the various aspects of my life.... They are all Chelmsford Alumni Hall of Famers,” he noted.

“These are people who are in there not only because of their personal success but also because of what they have meant to the many people who have had the fortune of meeting them over the years,” King said.

“The last person I credit with allowing me the opportunity to stand here and talk to you tonight is another CHS alumnus who may not be in this Hall of Fame but she would certainly be a first ballot lock in my personal hall of fame and that is my wife Dana. To paraphrase an old saying, ‘Behind every successful man is a woman doing all the hard work.’ That is entirely true in my case. I have had the opportunity to do lots of things in my life like teaching, coaching and now running for School Committee that would never been possible without the love, support and encouragement that I have gotten from Dana. Although things haven’t always been easy she has always remained strong, she has always remained positive, and she has always been the foundation that supports our family and for that I am eternally grateful.

“So, tonight I thank her, I thank the rest of my family, I thank my friends, and I thank all those who have given me guidance through the years that have allowed me the opportunity to receive this honor of being a member of the Chelmsford High School Alumni Hall of Fame,” he concluded.



CAITLIN KLICK-MCHUGH,
CLASS OF 1999

Caitlin Klick-McHugh was a star swimmer and runner at CHS and after her swim team went 13-0 her senior year, the CHS coaches voted her “Athlete of the Decade.” She was awarded both Swimmer of the Year and Runner of the Year by the Lowell Sun. Klick-McHugh went to Boston College on a full scholarship where she proceeded to break several records including the 400-yard freestyle and 800-freestyle relays.

A swim coach for many years in Westford, she was named Coach of the Year for the 2010-2011 and 2015-2016 seasons by the Eastern Mass. Interscholastic Swimming Coaches Association. Her Westford girls won the state championship in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2016.

In the classroom, she taught sixth-grade at McCarthy Middle School for 10 years where she launched the middle school cross country program and has taught physical education the past three there.

“I loved my time at Chelmsford High School, and that positive experience was a direct result of so many outstanding educators and coaches,” Klick-McHugh said, sending shoutouts to Al

Thomas, her first swim coach and founder of the Chelmsford High School girls' swim team.

"One of my first swimming memories was of myself returning from a bathroom break to Al questioning whether I really needed to get out of the water in the middle of a set. Although this would have left most kids unfazed, to a rule follower like myself, being called out by the head coach was a revelation. I realized that I was accountable for my own effort."

"Al's support continued into high school. Even though he was the dean of a different house, he would take the time to leave hand-written congratulations in my homeroom after swimming and track meets. This personal touch from a mentor like Al made CHS feel like home to me."

And it was Thomas who nominated her for induction.

She also thanked Josh Blagg for mentoring her as a coach at the Chelmsford Swim and Tennis Club and ultimately encouraging her to pursue a career in education.

"At the age of 22, he trusted me to take over as the head coach of the Westford Academy Girls' Swim and Dive team, a program that had been strong in the 80s, but had been completely resurrected by Josh... It was especially fun to see it come full circle this winter when his daughter joined the team and became a vital part of our 5th State Title in the last 6 years.

She lauded Hall of Fame swim coach Harriet Kinnett, who has been her co-coach the past 12 years.

"In high school, I really thought the Lowell Sun and the Boston Globe were at each of our meets, following our every move," she said. "Little did I know that it was actually Harriet

putting in the extra time to make sure we were getting just as much coverage as the football team."

Out of the pool, she also had kind words for longtime girls track and cross-country coach Jack Lang.

"Jack understood and respected his athletes," she said. "He valued our input, and wasn't afraid to let us try a variety of events."

And she couldn't have asked for a better athletic director than Jack Fletcher.

"Mr. Fletcher had a way of making his athletes feel like superstars," she said. "Walking down the hallway, he knew everyone's name, and was quick to congratulate us on a specific accomplishment."

Klick-McHugh also thanked her parents.

"My dad spent weekends playing baseball in the yard with me just as much, if not more, than he played with my three brothers... When I got more interested in swimming, a sport he wasn't as familiar with, I can remember him trying to analyze the rotation of my flip turns from the perspective of a physicist to help stay connected to my interest."

Her mom, she said, "would wake me up kicking and screaming just after 4 a.m. to drive me into Cambridge for morning practice. She would then curl up in my swim parka to try to catch some sleep in the frigid Harvard parking lot before having to drive me to school."

Her final thanks were saved for her wife, Shauna, a CHS alum, for "being the brains and backbone behind the swim programs that we coach together."

"I'm excited to see my daughter Emma attend Chelmsford High School down the road where I know the access to a variety

of outstanding programs is unmatched," she concluded.



LAURIE CARSON SHUFRIN,
CLASS OF 1990

Called one of the most accomplished student athletes in CHS history, Carson Shufrin in her junior year beat all MVC track and field competitors in six events (300m low hurdles, 100m high hurdles, 200m sprint, 400m sprint, triple jump and long jump.) An MVP in both her junior and senior years, Laurie broke her own records, prompting longtime girls track coach Jack Lang to call her at the time, "the best all-around athlete I've ever coached."

She was also an outstanding basketball and volleyball player and when she went to Holy Cross to study economics/accounting and play basketball, she helped lead the team to two Patriot League championships. After graduation, she took on various accounting jobs and earned her CPA, working for firms like Aspen Technology and BP plc in Chicago. Since becoming a full-time mom, Laurie has been active in the Littleton school community, from PTO to girls travel basketball coach.

"Those of you who know me know that I have been dreading this very moment since I got the call from Mr. Simonian informing me of my selection – having to speak in front of a room full of people AND having to talk about myself are

probably 2 of my worst nightmares.”

So she didn't, instead focusing on those who helped her through “this crazy adventure called life.”

“When I think back and reflect on my time at Chelmsford High, although my family and I experienced a great loss and tragedy while I was there, my memories are not filled with sorrow over losing Johnny but with all the wonderful teachers, coaches, teammates, friends and administrators who guided me, comforted me and helped me not only succeed at Chelmsford High School but also helped me become the woman that I am today,” she said.

Even though she called herself the product of “2 relatively non-athletic potato pickers from the sticks of Maine,” she was drawn to sports for its many life lessons: perservance, to be competitive, disciplined, hard work, sacrifice, setting goals, etc.

“It's the people you surround yourself with, the lessons you learn from your coaches, teammates and parents and your own happiness that makes life (and playing sports) the most worthwhile,” she said.

She also rattled off a who's who of CHS educators who helped her along the way: Mrs. Nordengren, Mr. Pasquale, Mrs. Dubin, Mrs. Foley, Mr. Doherty and Mr. Battle... Deans Conrad, Taranto and Quinn and to the “most wonderful principal anyone could ask for...there's a reason he's called “Mr. Chelmsford” – he embraced my family and myself and still to this day brings a smile to my face and warmth in my heart... Mr. Simonian.”

Having coached her daughter's basketball team the past seven years has given her a newfound

appreciation for her coaches at CHS, from Dana, Miss Williams, Coach Richards, Coach Lang, Coach Dick, Coach Durkin, Russ Hartman, Coach Gibbons and Mr. Fletcher.

“Lastly I'd like to thank my parents – for always supporting me, encouraging me and being my true supporters from day one,” she said. “I can't remember them ever missing a game, a match or track meet in either high school or college. They would travel through blizzards to upstate New York or somewhere in the middle of Pennsylvania or even fly to Nebraska or North Carolina to attend all my games and events and be there to support my teammates and myself. Still to this day they continue to support my kids in all their activities and are fully invested in our lives. They have shown me and continue to show me and my family unconditional love and support and for that I can't be more grateful.”



**ANNA M. SWIERZBIN,
TEACHER**

Ann Swierzbin's long teaching career began at McFarlin School in 1968. She began her CHS teaching stint in 1982 and taught the gamut of math courses through 2004. Her former colleague and principal, Steve

Meidell, called her “an innovative and unique educator who is able to inspire students of varying levels of talents and academic motivations to realize their potential.”

Serving as class co-advisor in 1991 and 1996, Swierzbin was lauded by Student Council President John MacPhee for helping students “build leadership skills” and learn empathy. Even in retirement, Ann serves as an elementary math curriculum facilitator and math coach for grades K-5.

“So many wonderful people in my life to be thankful for:

My family (my core village), Tony, Meredith (CHS Class of 1990) and Tim (CHS Class of 2000), son in law Greg, my grandson Connor (CHS Class of 2026) and to my extended Chelmsford family Dana DeFilippo(former varsity Volleyball coach at CHS) and her daughter Gweyn (CHS Class of 2013),” Swierzbin began, adding “heartfelt thanks and much love to my daughter for nominating me and to my dear friends and colleagues Nancy Williams and Sandie Taylor for seeing the application process through to its completion.”

She credited former colleagues, like (Principals, Simonian, Meidell, Thomas, and O'Bryant, the Deans Conrad, Taranto, Quinn, Battle, and Doherty, Athletic Director Jack Fletcher) all of whom “Left No Child Behind” and believe with every fiber of their being that “Every Child Can Succeed” long before these became the catch phrases for national education programs.

“A Chinese proverb advises that ‘if you are planning for a year, sow rice; if you are planning for a decade, plant trees; if you are planning for a

lifetime, educate people,” she shared.

“So much truth to that statement: What an amazing profession this teaching is... it allows us to, as Christa McAuliffe, educator and astronaut, so rightly said: “... touch the future...”

“Math teaching is a little like going to Disney World, it can be the Magic Kingdom full of wonder and excitement, it can be Buzz Light Year going to “Infinity and Beyond,” and still for some it can be The Tower of Terror, hearts racing with anxiety...”

“To all my students who thrived with an analytical way of thinking, I thank you for your interest and participation, but especially for those students who were anxious about mathematics, a double thank you because every time you said, “I don’t understand,” I needed to think of another way to help you comprehend this “foreign language” we call “mathematics.”

“Fostering PRIDE (Perseverance, Respect, Integrity, Dedication, and Empathy) in our Chelmsford children is the mission in the classroom and beyond... one of the best ways to connect with kids is to meet them on the playing fields, on the stage in music, drama, and the arts and the many clubs and activities that CHS provides,” Swierzbin said.

“Thomas Merton said, ‘Life is a great gift and a great good not because of what it gives us but because it enables us to give to others.’” ♦






