





# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Al Thomas

The first semester of the 2008-2009 school year is about to come to a close. A highlight of the fall sports season was the first Division I Girls Swimming and Diving Championship in school history. The team has finished second in the state in each of the previous eight seasons. It was a true team victory as they finished 107 points ahead of Acton-Boxboro while only winning one event, the 200 Yard Medley Relay. Numerous athletes placed in the top twelve allowing the team to take the title. For their relay victory, Erin Phinney, Mary Kate Cohen, Kelsey Sheridan and Anna Otto receive All-Scholastic and All-Conference honors. Congratulations to the girls and Coaches Harriet Kinnett and Josh Blagg and the rest of their staff.

At the end of November the annual "Spirit Week" led up to the football team's victory over Billerica. It was a great event and involved virtually every student. There was intense competition in several areas. Girls from the four classes competed in "Powder Puff" football games. Afterward, students paid to slam a wrecked car with sledge hammers. Students bought links to make spirit chains and contributed to help their

class try to win "penny wars". Each class designed and built creative "spirit walls. There was a large "Spirit Dance" and everything culminated with the biggest, loudest and most enthusiastic pep rally in the state.

The introduction of the PLUS Block this year has proven to be valuable for a variety of reasons. NEASC, our accrediting agency, requires each student to have an adult mentor, someone who knows them and can advocate for them or provide support. The PLUS Block provides an opportunity for that relationship to develop. also provides an opportunity for academic intervention for students who are not being academically successful. In any subject that the student is receiving a grade below 70%, the student is required to get extra help at least once a week. The number of D's and F's at the end of Term 1 was significantly down compared to the same time period last year. At least some credit must be given to the PLUS Block.

The number of class-time interruptions has been reduced. Routine business such as daily announcements, distribution and

collection of forms, guidance contacts and class meetings can be done during this daily half-hour. Students also appreciate some unscheduled time during which they can get organized, do some reading or get make-up work.

The CHS library is now the "Learning Commons". Early in December, a wonderful reception was held so that citizens and town officials could see the wonderful renovated facility. Librarian Valerie Diggs and her staff were recognized by local, regional and national dignitaries for their work in turning the area into a true educational and cultural center.

CHS students and faculty members continue to do significant charitable work. The Red Cross Club recently collected pajamas for children in area shelters. They also ran a successful blood drive and will offer another


in the spring. The National Honor Society collected "Soles for Souls". Shoes were gathered for those in need. The Reality Check classes (health classes for juniors and seniors) once again collected money to support the Shriners' Burn Center. Despite interruptions due to bad weather, they amassed over \$2,000. Last year, without interruptions due to storms, they took \$5,000 to the facility. The faculty raised over \$1,200 for the Secret Santa Fund after students, individually and through classes and PLUS Blocks, provided numerous gifts. These efforts are done for the right reason. Students see needs and want to help.

The CHS Performing Arts Center is constantly in use for a variety of events. For example, over 100 juniors and seniors were inducted into The National Honor Society. Some 500 student athletes participated in the annual Fall Sports Awards Night. The

CHS Theater Guild put on their fall show, It Runs In The Family, a simply hilarious comedy, which drew good crowds. There have also been three major assemblies – Rachel's Challenge, national motivational speaker Harvey Alston, and Mr. Robert Siciliano, who spoke on identity.

Security at CHS was improved this fall by closing in the ends of the two wings of the building. That makes access from outside virtually impossible and gives student other routes to use between classes. Also, during school hours, visitors have to be buzzed into school via the front door. All other doors are locked, though faculty may gain access by using swipe cards.

The second semester is always very busy. Check our website for current information. Grads should feel free to contact the school if they still have questions about any of those events.

#### CHS ALUMNA PROFILE

# CLAIRE LYNCH ('54)

Claire Lynch is sitting in the cozy kitchen of her Crooked Spring Road home, a gas fireplace warming the room as well as the visitor just welcomed in from January's winter chill.

"I'm nothing special, really," she insists, as her alumni profile interview for this edition of The Lion's Pride begins.

Many people would beg to differ. "If she bled, it would be maroon and white," Chelmsford High Alumni Association Executive Director George Simonian says of his former employee.

Lynch, class of 1954, is one of the association's biggest boosters, says Simonian, who was principal at Chelmsford High during a good chunk of Lynch's employment there in various secretarial and aide-related roles. Lynch served for years in the career center at CHS, Community Education Department, and in Hawthorne House. And not only does Lynch write The Lion's Pride class notes for her class -- which graduated when CHS was at the site of the current town offices and McFarlin Manor senior housing - she also continues to work as a substitute at the high school nine years after her "retirement."

"She's a character. I wish we had more like her," Simonian says. "She's a hot ticket. She'd do anything for me." Lynch was born in Lowell. Her family moved to North Chelmsford "after the wars." She took mostly business-type courses in high school, which would serve her well at Lowell Commercial College and in the assorted hats she's worn over the years (officially 35, but still going strong in retirement) for the Chelmsford Public Schools. One of her favorite jobs was working as an aide at the former Quessy School, around the corner from her home. The four-room schoolhouse had but 125 students. "I was like their mother," she recalls. "Everyone knew each other." Working at CHS, even today, Lynch says, "I get to see the good stuff," not the trouble-makers. "I got to meet many kids. Some of those kids are now teaching at the high school. It's nice."

As for her days as a CHS student, "We just had a good time," she says. "It was fun. I had some great teachers." Lynch had a special fondness for Mildred Hehir, who with 49 ½ years in the system was perhaps the Chelmsford educator with the longest run. That fondness remains, with Lynch driving Hehir to St. John The Evangelist Church in North Chelmsford each weekend for Mass. "She's very people oriented, and she does a lot of volunteer work," Hehir says of her former student and now friend. "Claire just gets involved in a lot of things. She's always doing stuff for people. She's very kind."

And Hehir isn't the only senior citizen Lynch helps out. She's a regular volunteer at the Chelmsford Senior Center on Groton Road, doing everything from manning the phones to serving meals. She also continues to work the polls on election days, checking voters into Precinct 3 at Harrington School.

When she's not helping out at CHS or at the senior center, Lynch spends time with her family. Her husband Joe, whom she married in 1956, is a retired Chelmsford firefighter. Their four kids, Michael, Mickey, Kevin and Mary Ann are all grown and have given Claire and Joe eight grand-children. There have been vacations: Alaska, Hawaii, Myrtle Beach are quickly offered as fond memories.

So too are times spent with classmates. "We still get together two or three times a year. We've lost a couple, but we're so blessed," she says, noting she soon needs to begin planning her 55th class reunion. "It's a good school. We had fun. There were dances, football games. We were close. We'd go skating at the lake, and we worked."

"It's a unique town," she says, noting there has been tremendous growth since and she her husband moved into their home next to a big red barn in 1956. "But it's still Chelmsford. I wouldn't ever leave this town."



# IN MEMORY OF DR. HENRY C. ZABIEREK

Henry C. Zabierek (June 8, 1924 – October 31, 2008)

> A Eulogy November 14, 2008

All of us who are gathered here today were touched in some way by Henry Zabierek. My father was a remarkable and memorable man. A man of faith, he led a full, meaningful life. He left an indelible mark on those lucky enough to have known him.

As a son, Henry gave his parents, Polish immigrants, every reason to be proud. Class President, an exceptional student and athlete, and loyal friend to many, Henry's only misgiving was that he didn't accomplish as many daily chores as his father, who was widely considered the hardest working man in Chelmsford. Henry's focus was on his studies and basketball (not necessarily in that order). His star was recognized with a full scholarship to the University of Rhode Island, where he scored 28 points in his first game and played in a national championship game. And in 1992, Henry was elected into the Chelmsford High School Hall of Fame.

As a brother, Henry shared a mutual respect for his brothers and sisters. Their beginnings were humble, sharing one bedroom in a small farm house at 50 Hildreth Street. Henry would joke that "when you

grow up on a farm with five brothers and sisters, the first one to wake up is the best dressed." He shared his life with all five of them, actually growing closer as the years went on. In Henry, one could see Julian's steadiness, Ted's timeliness, Helen's selflessness, Roy's leadership, and Stephie's generosity. What a wonderful mosaic.

As a soldier, Henry served in WWII's Pacific Theater with honor. He left college in the midst of his freshman year after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Years later, when students asked him how he could sacrifice his dreams for his country, he would reply humbly "you may not believe it, but when we were young, we did what we were told." During the prime of his life, he fought a fanatical enemy for nearly four years in the dense, muddy jungles of New Guinea and the Philippines. Of the thirty-two soldiers that landed with him, only two survived the war. As an artillery gunner, Sergeant Zabierek sacrificed his hearing but, fortunately for us, not his life. As years went on, he attended annual reunions of his I Company buddies, sharing a bond that few of us can fully appreciate.

As a student, Henry was drawn simultaneously to history and education. His passion for learning spanned his entire life. He left a book collection that could fill a library. We jokingly referred to his

college experience as the "30 year plan", given that first day on the URI campus was in September 1941 and he received his PhD from Carnegie Mellon in 1971. His was an inquisitive and brilliant mind, and he was always thrilled to have an opportunity to challenge it.

As an educator at the high school and college levels, Dr. Zabierek made significant contributions not only to history curriculum but also as an administrator. Dr. Zabierek stood for everything good about teaching and everything good about leading and inspiring a teaching staff. His values about the human side of social studies, and the opportunities for intellectual growth for kids through social studies, infused every meeting, every conversation, and every memo. Want to know how to be a mentor, coach, and supervisor all-in-one, even through those roles can sometimes be incompatible? Follow Dr. Zabierek's model. He was all about inquiry, rigor, and passion in the program he presented kids, and he didn't need No Child Left Behind, state competency exams, or anything else to help him find his way and lead his team.

He was powerful and invested mightily in his students. These contributions were not soon forgotten – in fact his first class of students at Punahou were so inspired by Zabe that they flew him back to Honolulu for reunions. The enduring affection

of his students is a tribute to his competence, fairness, and, most of all, his humanity. Back on the mainland, Hank was awarded the "Best Darn Teacher" award by his students at Lincoln-Sudbury. In Brookline, where he spent most of his career, his colleagues called his "the ultimate educator" and "our dream teacher." Henry talked the talk and walked the walk when it came to high standards and a true ethical basis for teaching and curriculum. He loved history and believed in kids, and it showed.

While he was in Brookline, he helped conceive, develop, and build an internationally recognized citizenship education program called Facing History and Ourselves. He embarked on a multidecade journey with the two key founders – Margot Strom and Marty Sleeper – who still lead the organization today. Together they created the means to help other teachers love their students and recognize their role in promoting moral development. What a great gift to leave for future generations.

As a political debater, Hank equally enjoyed reverence and contempt. It didn't matter which, as long as the deliberations were informed and intense. I don't want to say that my father was an unabashed liberal, but his direction forward usually consisted of four left turns. Many years ago, one of his former students at Punahou took Hank golfing one day at Oahu Country Club. Hank kept shanking his ball to the right on hole # 16. After the third ball he just sat in the cart after picking up and said "My ball is like the rest of the country . . . . always going to the right!" That same student asked me to recognize him and our president-elect as two of Punahou's finest outcomes.

As a Boston sports fan for eight de-

cades, each season provided Hank lessons in humility and character building. He worked as a play-by-play announcer for basketball, baseball, and football, and would have done so for free. His zeal for that job was such that my birth was announced by him on the air during a high school basketball game.

As much as he enjoyed covering and critiquing the Celtics, the Bruins, and the Patriots, his true love was baseball and his Red Sox. I vividly recall my first game at Fenway with my father in 1969, when Rico Petrocelli hit a grand slam to beat the Twins 6-2. Fiercely competitive, he was the de facto founder of the real Red Sox fan club, an exclusive organization that one must be born into. When my son Henry was born and inducted in 2004, my dad's open letter to him ended with "Hey, it's all right for Red Sox fans to cry. Yours through thick, Grandpa." As we all know, a few months later the Red Sox won their first World Series in 86 years. Coincidence?

As an uncle, grandfather, and father-in-law, Hank serves as a model to all of us. He never meddled, never got in the way, never wanted to be a bother. But he never forgot a birthday or anniversary, even if we did. He treated daughters-in-law as if they were his own children – most times even better. He LOVED his grandchildren. Gramp Z had literally thousands of pictures to prove it. Alex, Matt, Brie, Jackson, Henry, Benjamin, Olivia, and Isabella are blessed to have Gramp Z in their memories. He spoke with great pride of all their accomplishments, big or small.

Finally, as a father, we could not have asked for more. He was generous, supportive, and caring. He showed us things but encouraged us to be independent and figure things out on our

own. He taught us how to throw a curveball but not how to hit one. It was less important to him that we could recite facts and more important that we knew how to think.

He was brutally honest but we knew exactly where we stood with him. He did not mince words. He did not suffer fools. He softened his toughness with humor. When my brother complained of a broken finger, my dad's reply was "put a glove on, no one will notice." But he was genuinely interested in us and what we were doing and thinking. Dad's quick wit, silly sense of humor, and irreverence for sacred cows made it easy for us to question authority – which we did. What I will always remember about my father is that when we did something wrong, he was right there behind us, supporting us and helping us, and taking all the blame. But when we did something right, he was stage right, cheering with everyone else, and giving us all the credit.

Most importantly, my father taught us how to love and care for our mother. It is yet another wonderful gift to hand down to our sons and daughters.

Henry, Hank, Dr. Zabierek, Dad, Gramp Z, Zabe, Uncle Hank – he was many things to many people. He bridged a time that we could only read about and wonder. He experienced things few of us ever will and yet he was not stuck or mired in those times. He made the transition because of his natural curiosity and faith.

While it would be unconscionable not to mourn his passing, it would be equally unconscionable not to remember the lessons of his life. He taught us much; we are all the better for it.
