Another year started and we already have so much to celebrate. The Chelmsford Public Schools completed the first of a three year partnership with the Harvard University Graduate School of Education. Mathematics education Professor Dr. Jon Star and his team worked with four middle and high school teachers on developing multiple explanations for solving algebra problems. This summer, teachers from Chelmsford and two other districts attended a week long summer institute with the Harvard researchers. This is a partnership that we hope continues well past the three year time frame.

Speaking of partnerships, Chelmsford will be participating again in the TEA program. The University of Massachusetts Lowell (UML) has been awarded the U.S. Department of State's Teaching Excellence and Achievement (TEA) grant for Spring 2018. The program brings experienced educators from around the world to share their best practices with American educators. Teachers from CHS will be joining other area teachers pairing up with their international counterparts. This is professional development at its best. This grant will allow UML to host twenty middle and high school teachers selected from across the globe for professional development field-based experiences, and cultural exchange. The program will run for six weeks from January 26, 2018.



Our All Town Wind Ensemble had two huge engagements. At the end of September, they played the national anthem at Fenway Park for a Red Sox game. A short time later, this talented group of musicians played at Carnegie Hall.

The band hit new records. We have 118 students in our band. There are so many students in our band, we ran out of uniforms. This is a good problem to have. Watching them perform makes a person think they are attending the University of Chelmsford. I would put our band up against many college bands any day. Performance music in Chelmsford is second to none.

Our students are leaders both at the town and state level. The National Honor Society, led by Ms. Katherine Doulamis and Ms. Leah Gaffney, received quite an honor. Our NHS students were asked to present at the state-wide NHS conference. The focus of their presentation will be leadership

in the community. How to do a district-wide fundraiser and get strong community support will be the focus of their presentation. For the past decade, NHS did a community fundraiser called, "Haunt of a Cure." Teaming up with the Paul Center, NHS students created an interactive Halloween Fair for children to have a safe and fun Halloween experience. All money raised is donated to the Paul Center. The success of this fundraiser caught the attention of the National Honor Society leaders at the state level. This prompted their request to have our students present at the state conference. We are very proud of the work that our NHS students demonstrate.

Mr. Brian Acheson is opening the doors of exploration for his students. For the third year, Mr. Acheson's class joined the Massachusetts Biotechnology Education Foundation (MassBioEd). The primary goal of this foundation is to match students up with Biotech companies in the area. Through this partnership, students get mentoring, and are given opportunities to talk to scientists in this field. They learn about the research process, laboratory work and many different aspects of the biotechnology profession. Our partner in this program is Shire Biotechnology Company. We sincerely appreciate the opportunity that MassBio Ed and Shire is giving the students at CHS.

The next 1.5 million would be set aside to fund the operation of a building once it is built, and the last 3.5 million which will not be an endowment but would directly fund the erecting of a building of which all CHS alumni can be justifiably proud. I know

these are very ambitious goals that may take some time to complete, but it is the intent of your leadership to see that they are accomplished. The success of the CHSAA depends on us achieving these goals.

Project SHARE is in the process of initialization and we are looking for alumni who would be willing to give a couple of hours to help a CHS student with their plans for their future. You can help them in any number of ways from talking about college choice, to helping with career choice decisions, to helping craft their resume or doing mock interviews to improve their skills in that area. These are only some of the ways you can help, and I am sure there are many more.

In closing I hope everyone has had a wonderful summer and that your upcoming holidays will be filled with joy and happiness for you and your families.

LOOKING TO RAISE THE LION'S SHARE

FORMER CHS HOCKEY STANDOUT HOPES TO RAISE A COOL \$9 MILLION TO ENDOW THE CHSAA AND BUILD IT A PERMANENT HOME



Chelmsford High Hall of Famer Heather Linstad made her mark on hockey rinks all across New England, first as a standout player, then for 21 years as a coach. Now the 1985 CHS graduate hopes to bring that same drive and passion to perhaps her biggest undertaking yet – raising a cool \$9 million to help endow the Chelmsford High Alumni Association and ultimately build it a permanent home.

Linstad was hired June 1 by the association's board of directors to jumpstart the capital fundraising campaign, which sputtered after its initial effort from 2008 to 2010 when the economy tanked.

With only \$40,000 to \$50,000 in the fund to date, according to Executive Director George Simonian, Linstad's task may appear to be an uphill battle, but it's one she says she is ready to take on.

"I have no problem asking people for money," she said during a recent interview at Simonian's dining-room table, where much of the CHSAA's business has been conducted since its inception 28 years ago.

Her goal is to have \$1 million in the coffers by next June. Fundraisers like the Oct. 15 cornhole throwdown at the Elks aren't going to raise the big money, but they will provide a social setting where stories about the successes and strengths of the association will be shared hopefully with individuals who may be able to contribute significant sums of money to a cause they find worthy.

Simonian said the first two million

raised will go toward endowing the association, by enrolling all graduates, dues-free, and paying for the publication of this magazine and the like in perpetuity. The second 2.5 million would be to fund an executive director and support staff to run the association, since at 89, Simonian said he won't be around forever to do so.

The final fundraising push would be to cover the costs of building and maintaining an "Alumni Hall" on the grounds of CHS – a parcel nestled between the two Richardson Road entrances to the front and rear of the school -- donated nearly 10 years ago by the town.

Contrary to a recent social media post, there would be no taxpayer dollars put toward its construction or maintenance. That's the ultimate goal of this campaign. The hall would give the association a place to hold meetings, host reunions, showcase awards and "all the great stuff" that makes Chelmsford High what it is, Simonian said. The SHARE program, which aims to pair graduating seniors with alumni for college and career mentoring, would also find a more comfortable setting for networking than the school cafeteria.

"There's got to be a place where we can share the camaraderie, to help kids," said Linstad. "Sometimes being in a different place helps.

"This addresses a need," she continued. "(CHSAA President) Terry (McSheehy) and George don't sell themselves enough," she said, noting that from the scholarships that are given out every year, to the annual Hall of Fame inductions and so many other great things the association does, she doesn't believe that story is told enough.

Other upcoming initiatives will be comedy nights, a brochure campaign and in March, "a day of giving," where alumni and the community will be encouraged to make donations to the fund.

She is also trying to engage CHS students in the effort, using art students for design help with the brochures and the like.

Linstad has also been working with Steve Normandin on chsalumni.org, the association's website, to get the word out about the campaign. She is also conducting interviews on Chelmsford Telemedia, the local cable access channel, and has plans to have scholarship recipients

and sponsors speak about their experiences.

Simonian pointed to my own 40th Class of 1977 reunion held in June at the Chelmsford Radisson. "Why have it at the Radisson?" he said. "That's not good enough. We want to do more for the kids, but I'm running out of gas."

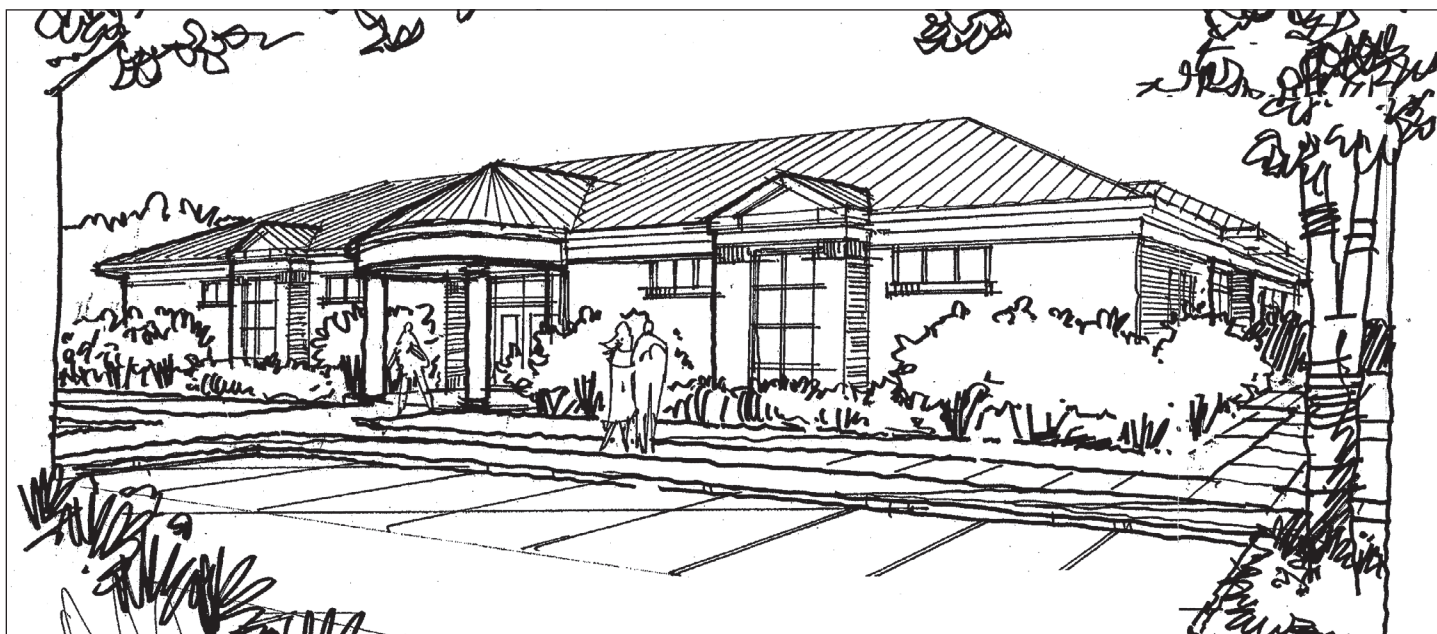
Now it's time, he said, for people like Linstad, the CHS girls softball coach, and others, to step up to the plate.

"I have lots of energy and drive," she said. "I moved back here to give back to the school that gave me so much."

She's hoping many more, especially those who may be well off financially, will also want to give back.

"People feel community support and camaraderie in this town like nowhere else," Linstad said. "There's so many diehard Chelmsford people."

As senior year kicks off, the newly-elected class officers are getting their first taste of what their position truly entails. From orchestrating the Senior Barbecue to promoting the Tundra Tango to preparing for the ever-nearing prom, Pat Slattery (president), Brian Tong (co-vice president), Diti Patel (co-vice president), Brendan Malone (secretary), and Tommy Snelson (treasurer) have a lot on their plates.

The primary focus of the officers is money. They work to find bargains for every event and budget their money carefully. "I want to make things affordable," Pat explains.

"We can't make things crazy cheap - that's almost impossible. But making things affordable for everyone is definitely a goal we need to strive to reach." Brian agrees. "We want everyone to have the same experience. They deserve to have it. They've worked just as hard as everybody else for the past four years. Money shouldn't be the defining factor in whether or not you have a great last few months at CHS."

Everyone chimes in, agreeing. "We want everyone to be successful," Brendan says. "We want everyone to have a fun, safe time."

But although a fun time is what they want, time may not always be what they have. As Tommy reveals, "The one thing we need is time.

The weeks leading up to cotillion were crazy for us. I had to stay after school every single day depositing thousands of dollars. I had lacrosse and work after school everyday, too." Apart from working and playing lacrosse, Tommy also skis and participates in DECA. Brendan has joined international relations and LIME, as well as keeping up his hobbies of art, writing, and playing in a band. They are all very busy, yet they all chose to add "class officer" to their resume as well.

When asked why they wanted to become officers, every answer was different.

"I had class with Duncan when he was a Junior," Tommy recalls, referencing the class of 2017 president. "I also knew Dhruv [2017 treasurer] from DECA. They said I'd be good for the position. I want to go into finances."

Brendan explains, "Being secretary was always in the back of my head. I like leading but I don't like being the center of attention."

Brian describes, "My parents came here [from Vietnam] with virtually nothing. Especially my dad. I just want to strive to work as hard as he did. I want to repay."

Diti tells, "My story's similar to Brian's. My parents came over from India with no education. They couldn't afford it. They didn't know any English; they came with nothing. That's why I think it's so important for me to give back and take every opportunity that comes my way. That's my motivation for most things."

“Both my parents grew up in Lowell,” Pat jokes. “But I have a twin brother who has cerebral palsy. He’s taught me a lot as a person. Knowing his situation could have just as easily have been mine inspires me to do a lot of things in my life.”

As for the future, Tommy would like to go to school for business, at the Isenberg School at UMass Amherst, or at Penn State. “I’d most like to see myself working for a start-up company, something new, and take an entrepreneurial route.”

Brendan would like to go to Northeastern, NYU, or Tufts, for mechanical engineering. “I’ll probably end up in grad school, and maybe sell my artwork as a part-time thing.”

Pat would like to study political science and Spanish. “My dream since I was a little kid would be to go to Notre Dame.” He glances down and realizes he’s wearing a Notre Dame sweatshirt, much to everyone’s amusement.

Brian would like to go to BC and study economics. “Hopefully I’ll go to law school after that. I want to find an opportunity where I can grow.”

Diti’s top choice is BU for business and management. “For grad school, I might go get my MBA or go to law school and become a corporate lawyer.” At this, Brian scowls and whispers, “Ugh, don’t copy me...” Diti laughs and says, “I’ll go to BC, too!”

All five of them are hard-working and incredibly humble. Their stories are all different, and each found his or her way into the position differently, but when they did, it was as if they had been friends for life. From just a couple 20-minute conversations with them, it was easy

to tell they had an unreplicable and seamless chemistry. “That’s something this position has taught us: compromise- working together with other people.” Pat expresses. They are serious and dedicated, but they have their silly moments too (I inquired if they had one thing to ask anybody in the world what it would be, and Brendan said without hesitation: “I’d ask JFK what his favorite doughnut is.” Tommy agreed). And if there’s one more thing they agree on, it’s their love for CHS.

“We have a fantastic faculty,” Pat smiles. “I’m proud to go to school here with all my classmates. I think it’s taught not only myself, but other people a lot of valuable skills that we’ll use for the rest of our lives. And everyone has their place in this school; there’s so much diversity. Everybody does their own thing. I think everyone makes the most of this school.”

So, although the five officers are busy orchestrating the Senior Barbecue and promoting the Tundra Tango and preparing for prom, as well as handling jobs, extracurriculars, and schoolwork, they are doing it all for the Class of 2018, and for the whole of Chelmsford High School. POLICE CHIEF JIM SPINNEY '86

ALUMNI Profile ▶ By Kris Pisarik *Class of 1977*



It seems that Police Chief Jim Spinney's course for a career in public safety was set at a very young age. He remembers growing up being so proud of his father, retired Chelmsford Fire Capt. James M. Spinney, for whom he is named. (Yes, he's a junior.)

"I'd see him in uniform and there'd be lights and sirens," Spinney recalled during a late-summer interview in his office at the police station, less than a mile from where he grew up on Locke Road. "I remember there was a fire in the neighborhood and my friend and I went racing down the street. And there was dad on the roof.

"When you're a kid it's all about the lights and sirens," he said, adding that as he grew older he wanted a career where he could see changes "day to day," and policing seemed like a good fit.

Spinney briefly entertained pursuing a career as a pilot or an air traffic controller, but admits he was scared off the amount of math that might be involved.

The 1986 CHS grad admits he wasn't among the very top students, calling himself an average to above-average student, with a special penchant for history. He enjoyed playing tennis and golf in high school, but said that by no means was he "a jock," though he and his friends enjoyed attending CHS sporting events, especially hockey games under longtime coach Jack Fletcher, whom Spinney also called "a real great teacher," one of his favorites.

After graduation, Spinney earned a BS in criminal justice from ULowell in 1990. He worked during school as an auxiliary police officer in Chelmsford, but upon graduating from the university, Chelmsford was undergoing layoffs, so he took a job as a full-time officer in the small town of

Greenville, N.H. – total police force of six officers. “The chief handed me the keys and said, ‘call me if you need me.’”

Two years later, he took a job with the Milford, N.H., force, a town about the size of Westford.

During his early career he married the woman he met in college, Karen Hilton, from Lowell, with whom he had two children, Kara, 25, who works in the health profession, and James, 22, a para-professional in the Hudson, N.H., schools, where the family made its home.

As his children grew, so did Spinney’s rank in the department. He joined the Chelmsford force in 1994 as a patrol officer, making sergeant in 2000, lieutenant in 2005 as a shift commander, deputy chief in 2013 and ascending to chief in October 2014.

It’s been a busy three years, with two officer-involved shootings in town – Sully’s ice cream in July 2016 and a domestic call in July 2017 – a reorganization of the department’s command staff and a greater push toward community policing – partnerships and problem-solving.

But perhaps what he is most proud of, Spinney said, is the establishment of school resource officers. This year, Officer Becky Tyros is stationed full time at CHS and a part-time officer is at the middle schools.

Not all entities in town were as cooperative when he took over as chief as they are today, he said.

“Before we were 100 percent reactive,” Spinney said. Having an officer in the building not only acts as a deterrent to crime, but also fosters good relationships and a sense of community, he added.

The opioid crisis continues to be a problem, though his officers have carried Narcan since 2014 under

retired Chief James Murphy. And after a non-fatal overdose, an officer is sent to the victim’s home to see if they can help, maybe offer a referral to a treatment center or the like, he said.

If he’s had a weakness as chief, Spinney said perhaps he needs to share more responsibility among his command staff and not just rely on a few “go-to” people.

“I always try to be fair and consistent with the public and the personnel here,” he stressed. “I’ve seen supervisors all over the map emotionally. You don’t want (your officers or the public) to think the wheels are coming off the bus.”

His advice for young people considering a career in law enforcement?

“It’s about empathy and partnerships and getting to the root of an issue,” he said. “You need to be a good listener.

“I am proud and honored to serve the Town of Chelmsford as police chief. When I began my career as a police officer in N.H., my ultimate hope and goal was to return to the town I grew up in and really care about,” he said. “As I look back I feel very fortunate that things played out the way they did, not only being hired by the Chelmsford Police Department, but to advance through all the ranks and end up as chief. ... Having grown up in town I feel I have the pulse of the community always in mind. I have a good idea as to what the residents of Chelmsford expect and demand from the Police Department. My ultimate responsibility is to make sure the Police Department is in touch with, and responds to the needs of the community, and to make sure the officers I oversee have the tools and the training to respond to those needs.” ♦

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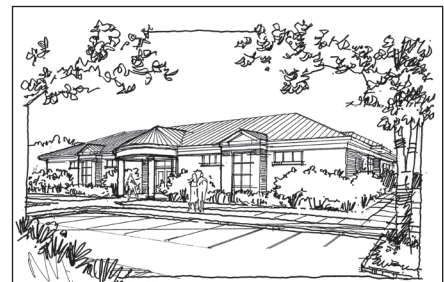
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THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS NIGHT

Now that her work has paid off, she will be attending the University of Maine with her two scholarships this fall.

Future UMass Amherst chemistry major Tristan Heck, who also received two scholarships for his dedication to Chelmsford High School and to his church, could attest to how wonderful it felt to be recognized for the hard work it took to earn his awards. "It's great that this exists," he stated, smiling. Referring to the financial help the scholarships undoubtedly provide, Tristan said appreciatively, "Every little bit counts."

The numerous other scholarship recipients shared similar feelings of gratitude; the countless smiling faces, jovial atmosphere, and congratulatory embraces from family and friends told it all. The recipients stood a little taller and smiled a little wider as they clutched their red folders in hand and posed for photos after the ceremony.

"In this world, there are too many people who keep taking," he said. "It's OK to take, but you've got to give back, too, and this is one way to give back."

Clearly the night had an impact on everyone who took part, recipients, presenters, organizers, and audience members alike.

The emotional evening ended with a lively reception where family members could be spotted munching on snacks and trying to squeeze in a few last photos with the recipients. Spirited conversation filled the lobby of the performing arts center as friends chatted, ate, and smiled. After careful planning and with the exceptional generosity of so many, another successful night of scholarship awards was coming to a close. As members of the Class of 2017 headed out on their next big adventures, it was time for the next group of students to prepare for their time in the spotlight. Bring on the Class of 2018! ♦

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR'S Report



The 2016/17 School Year was another great year for athletics capped off by our Spring Season.

Our Boys Lacrosse, Girls Lacrosse, Girls Tennis, Girls and Boys Track and Field and Boys Volleyball all qualified for the MIAA Tournament. Our Girls Tennis Team won the MVC Championship.

This Spring we had 420 Athletes competing in 9 Varsity Sports, 13 Sub-Varsity Programs, and a Student-Training Program with 10 Students.

The overall record for the spring was an impressive 97-50.

Individually in the Spring we had 24 Players selected to the All Conference Team and 21 Players Selected to MVC All Star Teams. Our Coaches also had outstanding seasons, including Coach Marcel Gamache who was named MVC Coach Of The Year in Girls Tennis, as well as Coach Sean Wright, who was named Coach of the Year for Boys Lacrosse.

At the end of the Spring Season the Athletic Department and the CHS Boosters held the Spring Awards Night and players received End of the Year Awards. Athletic Assistant Ryan Poisson, and Athletic Secretary Karen Colliton (who retired in June) were awarded the Distinguished

Service Award for all of their contributions to both the Athletic and Academic Community at CHS. We wish Karen all the best in her retirement. She will be missed!

Mr. Scott Moreau will also be missed as he also stepped down from the position of Athletic Director at CHS after 6 years in the role. Mr. Moreau was a large factor in the success of the CHS Programs over his tenure, and his foresight and hard-work allowed the Chelmsford Turf Field Project to come to fruition. For this, and the countless hours Mr. Moreau put into Chelmsford High School, the entire CHS Lions Community thanks you.

NEW ATHLETIC DIRECTOR DAN HART'S HIRING WAS 'FATE'

Everyone has something that gets him up in the morning (and no, I don't mean an alarm clock). Everyone has a unique drive, a passion, something they were just born to do. For Dan Hart, becoming Chelmsford High's new athletic director was no happy accident — it was destiny.

Born and raised in Chelmsford, Hart was an athlete from day one. He recalls, "I started playing ever since I could walk. I played every sport around here." Growing up, his love of sports flourished while playing with his friends and older kids in his neighborhood, as well as in town leagues. By the time he reached CHS, Hart decided to concentrate on his favorite sport — basketball -- year-round. He became a valued three-year member of the varsity basketball team, assuming the role of captain his senior year. Moreover, he helped lead the team to win MVC championships during both his junior and senior years, before graduating from Chelmsford High in 1999.

Hart completed his undergraduate education at UMass Dartmouth, graduating in 2004 with a degree in English. He had originally been recruited by the college to play for its basketball team, but ultimately decided not to join and focused on his studies instead. It was difficult, but Hart didn't let it stop him from continuing to play basketball all the time. In fact, by distancing himself a bit from the sport, he was able to appreciate it all the more, realizing he truly wanted to stay involved in it.

Chuckling, Hart remarks that "it was a fate thing."

Shortly after graduation, Hart began working as Supervisor of Students at McCarthy Middle School. He then returned to Chelmsford High School in the same role in 2010. Hart loved his job, as it gave him the chance to work with all kids around the school. If a student was having a hard time, or if a safety issue came up, he was the "first phone call," acting as the liaison from the kids to the administration. Whatever troubles the student was facing, in school or out, he was an essential resource to help them rebound back. The most important thing to Hart about the job was that he "got to help so many kids."

But Hart wasn't only helping students as supervisor during this time: he was also busy being a coach. It had always been something he wanted to do; even as a teen, he would devotedly coach youth basketball camps and help run intramural programs. Thus, from 2004 to 2010, Hart coached JV and freshman basketball, and was also varsity basketball assistant at CHS. Being a former CHS athlete, Hart commented "I got to coach with my coaches, which I loved." He learned the importance of "coaching the whole kid," meaning that it is a coach's job to teach a player not just plays and moves, but also character, and to help them find success outside of the court or playing field. Hart considers himself "very lucky to have coached with who I coached with," noting that this philosophy is something that he's taken with him ever since.

Hart's coaching career was only beginning. From 2011 to 2015, he served as head coach for boys basketball at Lowell Catholic High School. Hart remembers, "I was ready. By that point, I wanted to be a head coach." Hart viewed Lowell Catholic's Boys Basketball team as

a "sleeping giant." Where others saw a weak-to-mediocre team, Hart saw great potential. He and Coach Jack Fletcher "went in and built a program. We started from the bottom, up." The school had only qualified for the state tournament once in 25 years, and had never had a state tournament win. By Hart's second season of coaching, the team advanced to state semifinals; and during his third season, the team set the school record for wins, and made the tournament once more. These were nothing short of incredible feats for the team, but what Hart was truly most proud of was that "every single one of our kids went to college." Not every child is given equal opportunity to access higher education, and "seeing the kids use basketball as a tool to learn things and get to where they needed to go was amazing to see," he says.

In addition to his notable coaching experience, Hart was also the founder of Lions League Athletics, a youth instructional basketball program that offers leagues and camps for kids, and which additionally runs one of the biggest men's basketball leagues in the area. Hart founded Lions League in 2006 because he "wanted to get everybody playing." It started it out as a free program for high school kids to come down and play, but no one really came when it was free. After a parent pointed this out, Hart reluctantly realized the issue, and began charging an amount the following year, turning the Lions League into a private business. He worked tirelessly to bring great coaches from around the area to coach in Chelmsford once or twice a week, and from there the League kept growing. It expanded from just 36 high school boys to over 800 boys and girls yearly today,

kindergarten through 12th grade. To say that running the league was hard work would be an understatement, but Hart is especially grateful because “it really prepared me for this job, from setting budgets to keeping schedules to dealing with problems as they arise.” Equally important, Hart feels Lions League Athletics “strongly connected me with the community,” giving him the chance to meet new people of all generations in the basketball community of Chelmsford: from players to coaches to parents. As athletic director, Hart has recently passed on Lions League Athletics, but remains very excited for its future.

Now, Hart could not be more excited to take on the role of athletic director at CHS. Hart says, “I knew I wanted to work in athletics since always, forever.” Hart had a great experience in sports in Chelmsford, building strong connections and finding many lifelong friends in teammates and coaches. Now, he wants to give kids the same thing: “the best experience possible.” He has always thought “to oversee an athletic department — where you can really contribute to kids’ success — is really cool,” he says, adding, “especially in the building that I came up in, and that my kids and nephews and nieces are gonna come up in.” Chelmsford High will always have a special place in his heart.

As AD, Hart already has clear goals. To start, he wishes for the CHS teams “to become one,” firmly believing that an individual team’s “win is a win for all of us” and “loss is a loss for all of us.” Hart also strongly intends to tie in others aspects of the community into athletics. He stated, “We ask for a lot from our community, and we gotta give back.” To do this, Hart plans to get students involved in televising games and putting together a magazine show


online for CHS athletics, with score updates, interviews, and other news updates. He specifically wants the student athletes to run it so “they can own more of a piece of the Athletic Department.” Furthermore, he wants to give CHS athletes the spotlight, envisioning that this idea would really help to showcase what CHS Athletics is all about to the community.

Hart knows the job isn’t always easy, but he looks forward to the challenge. From schedules getting moved around, to buses getting canceled, to kids getting hurt, these daily problems “require you to constantly think on your feet,” explains Hart. He approaches such obstacles head-on: rather than shying away, his method is to ask, “How do we go and get this?” Hart adds, “If I’m ever not sure, I have a great team here too - our deans, Principal (Stephen) Murray, my secretary, Kate, and the coaches- and I work with them all the time to tackle big problems.”

Hart also has tremendous support from home: his wife, Kate, has always been very supportive of his work in athletics. A CHS graduate from ’02, she also came from a sports-loving family, and loved to play volleyball. Hart admits, “I wouldn’t be able to do any of this if she wasn’t as great as she is.” Hart and Kate have two rapidly growing children: a three-year-old daughter named Hailey (who already loves sports!) and a 10-month old son, Charlie. When he isn’t busy at work as AD, Hart enjoys being with his family and playing with his kids. He also still takes great pleasure in playing basketball and watching all sports. One thing’s for sure: if anyone was ever fated to become athletic director at CHS, that person is Dan Hart. ♦

Annual Meeting:
September 13, 2017

Good evening!

Lion's Pride: continues to be a great publication! Our first issue was printed in the fall of 1989, so we are now in our 28th year. We extend our thanks to Kris Pisarik, our Editor-in-Chief; Nancy Williams and Lynne McSheehy, our Class News Editors; Sandie Taylor on her role in Special Assignments and Alumni Profiles; and our Student Writers for their Student Profiles and special articles. We are also grateful to Christine Whittlesey for her all-inclusive Fine & Performing Arts report and Scott Moreau for his complete report of all things Athletic. Mary St. Hilaire contributes stalwartly as the Advertising Manager, and Lynne McSheehy and the proofreading team tune the issue up for printing. Nancy Hughes is faithful in recording the "In Memoriams," as is Jeff Gallant in his role as the Class Agent Liaison. The final production and mailing of each dynamite-looking issue is due to the excellent work of Paul Favreau and the Gilet brothers printing at Red Mill Graphics!

Endowment Fund: This fund, which provides financial support to alumni pursuing postsecondary education,

is currently valued at more than \$1,500,000. It continues to grow due to the generosity of alumni and friends giving back. More designated scholarships are being added to the endowment fund every year. As of this moment, we have 122 – with promises of more to come. (The principal of the fund generates income, which is then distributed as scholarships. The principal is not depleted.) The 19th annual Awards Night was held last May 23rd in the Carl Rondina Performing Arts Center, and it was attended by over two hundred recipients, parents, scholarship donors, CHS staff, the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee members, the Town Manager, Selectmen and Association members. It's a perfect venue for a great night! Over \$55,000 and 148 scholarships were awarded to CHS seniors and alumni who are presently in college and \$150 to a senior from Wilmington High School (in honor of late CHS grad, Carl Olsson, who taught at Wilmington High.) Since 1993 a total of over \$755,000 has been distributed in 1701 scholarships to CHS seniors and alumni and \$4300 to 20 Wilmington High School seniors. A special thanks to the Scholarship Committee, chaired by Joan Murphy, for their efforts in determining the scholarship recipients. Thanks also to Bob Pariseau for all his efforts in computerizing the entire scholarship application process, which has saved much time and paper, and has made the selection process much more efficient. Thanks to Lou DiStasi for his efforts in the logistics of the evening and compiling the certificates and scholarship checks, so that the presentations were made with clockwork precision. Another special thanks to Nancy Hughes and the Awards Night committee

for all their efforts in making the evening such a success! Finally, a big thanks to Terry McSheehy for another masterful job as Master of Ceremonies! ---The next Awards Night will be held in May, 14 2018. You are all welcome to attend.

Hall of Fame: The 27th Anniversary Hall of Fame was attended by 321 guests, who witnessed the induction of nine more great people! If you haven't been to one of these inductions, you're missing a great Chelmsford High Alumni Association event. The 2018 Hall of Fame induction will be held on March 24, 2018 at the UMassLowell Inn and Conference Center. This will be our 28th class! A special thanks goes out to the Hall of Fame Committee, co-chaired by Bruce McMaster and Howie Neild, and Nominating Committee chaired by Bob Pariseau.

Fourth of July 2017: There were a lot of mini-reunions, lots of fun, and a lot of visibility at the booth on the evening of July 3 and during the parade on the 4th! Thanks to Andy Barry for coordinating the activity and to the volunteer alumni who helped to man the booth. We signed up 5 new members; one grad joined for life; and 7 people rejoined.

Membership: The life line of the Association! As of the first of September, the Association has over 1000 dues-paying members. Over 500 of that number are Life Members. On the negative side, we still lose about a dozen members, due to non-payment of dues. Mike Desmarais is our dues collector and has been a big help. We send another special thanks to Bob Logan, who handles all our tax issues.

Alumni Authors' Corner: This corner of the Learning Commons at CHS has continued to grow with the works of published alumni, which are displayed and are available to be read. There are 122 works on display in a case, which was built a number of years ago. Many thanks to Mark Maybury for all his efforts in collecting the works and preparing them for display. Everyone should make an effort to see the Authors' Corner.

HIGH SCHOOL INITIATIVES:

Student Board Members: Three years ago we added two students as non-voting members of the Board of Directors. This initiative continues to be very successful.

Project SHARE: This initiative involves the Alumni Association with the Career Center in the high school and is a work in progress. Dennis Hunt is directing this project, and his work will bring Alumni together with current students, so that information and understandings can be given to students who are trying to figure out their direction – both with respect to further education and to life in general. Alumni will be recruited to volunteer to mentor students.

Capital Campaign: The Capital Campaign has been re-established under the leadership of Heather Linstad, CHS '85, as Campaign Chairman. The major objectives of this Campaign: 1. To raise 9.5 million dollars; 2. Endow the first 2 million to stabilize the Association financially and eliminate dues; 3. To endow the next 2.5 million to hire an Executive Director and Assistant to operate the Association on a day-to-day basis; 4. Set aside 1.5 million in an endowment, the proceeds of which would fund the operation of a building, once it is built. 5. The last 3.5 million would be used to construct an Alumni Hall to house the Association and become a home for all the activities that an active Alumni Association conducts. Thanks to Tom Curran and his committee for sponsoring the third annual Golf Tournament, with all proceeds going to the Capital Campaign.

At this time, I would like to thank Principal Steve Murray and the staff at the high school for their 100% support of our Alumni Association over the past number of years and our Superintendent, Dr. Jay Lang and his office staff for their continuous support and for allowing us to use the high school building whenever we need to – such as tonight, our Annual Meeting.

In closing, I would like to thank Terry McSheehy for all that he does as President. Thanks to our Treasurer, Elisa Ouellette, for keeping all our financial matters neat and clean by keeping the books, crunching the numbers, and paying the bills. To Nancy Hughes, our clerk, who never misses a Board Meeting; to Michelle Maybury for efforts as our Recording Secretary; to Lynne McSheehy, for taking on the role of Administrative Assistant to the Executive Director; and finally, to the Board of Directors and all of

the Committee Members who have worked hard this past year to make this organization the huge success it is today. Public high school Alumni Associations are a rare species. We are in our 29th year of doing good things for CHS and its Alumni. Thank you for listening!

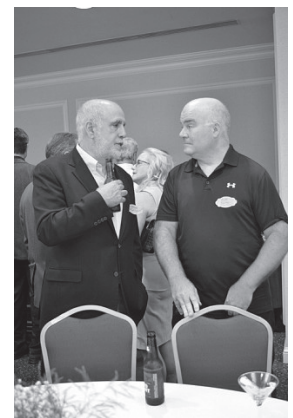

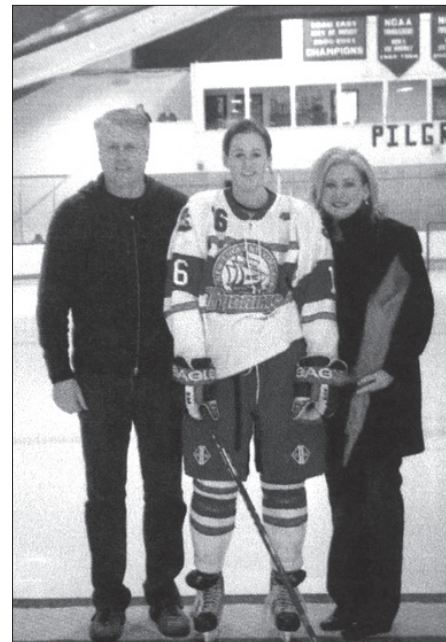

Ten years ago, Kaleigh was profiled in an article in the Lowell Sun ("She's All Heart," by Lynn Worthy) which told of her amazing recovery from what had looked like an un-fixable medical problem. As the result of an onset of troubling symptoms during ice hockey practice, including a consistently racing heart, a congenital heart problem (Wolf-Parkinson-White syndrome, which throws off the timing of the heart's electrical signals) was discovered when Kaleigh was 14. Good Riddance Hurricane Irma!

Hello everyone! First, I want to thank everyone for your phone calls, texts, emails, prayers, and support. It meant a lot to Chuck, Dolly and me. Having said all that, this is a story of some of the misery and destruction in the entire state of Florida. In addition, I thought you might like hear how some of your classmates are doing, which I will share with you.

For us here in St. Augustine, the preparations started during Labor Day Weekend. At that point, Irma was heading up the east coast as a category 4 storm. On Monday, we talked to Bob ('50) and Charlotte (Dinnigan '51) White who offered their home in Lady Lake FL (in The Villages area). Ok, great 2 1/2 hour easy drive South West of us, on the secondary roads. Bob and Charlotte '51 were at their home MA. Tuesday, packing our Hurricane bag for Dolly and us, Wednesday, gas for the car and water. Water was just about out. Started to get shortage of gas and water, our gas comes from Houston and our water supplies went to Houston. Thursday; collecting all insurance policies and Dolly records, etc., etc. to put in a safe place. Chuck went for more water, no luck. Friday, put up hurricane panels and moved all the plants and pool furniture into the house as well as anything in the yard that would blow away like a missile. Saturday, called Bob to thank him for his offer, telling him we decided to ride out the storm at home as I-95 etc. are all backed up from those from south Florida being evacuated. Irma is now going up Central FL. We are experiencing a

Nor Easter with winds and rain not related to Irma. Now it is the last minute preparations. Sunday, mandatory evacuation, but no place to go. Our neighbors have also decided to ride it out. Ok, now relax! We don't know when the Nor Easter left or when Irma began. Winds and more rain. They will shut the water off on the Island. Filled lots of buckets, the tub and the empty bottles I use for watering plants. By noon, Irma was cranking up. Had dinner, then bedtime. Lost power at 1:30 am. From then on, it was very scary. Thunder storms, rain, winds gusting to eighty-nine miles an hour, strings of tornadoes. 3:00 am was the worst. I went into our middle closet. A tornado touched down at our neighbors. Debris was hitting our hurricane panels. Irma was very noisy and loud, throughout the night. Chuck had drained out some of the pool water, down about six inches, twice during Irma, at night. We only had one inch to spare in the morning, before it would have come over. Irma, a Category 1 lasted about 24 hours. Matthew was a Category 2, he came and went, during the day.

We were so glad to be able to look out Monday morning at 8:00 am when the winds had started to die down and were very blessed to have made it through that miserable night. God was good. All our neighbors made it as well. Lots of trees down, debris everywhere. But that was ok as all our houses were ok. A total here of eight inches of rain. Chuck did a fantastic job cleaning small debris out of our pool. The streets are lined with trees and tree debris is piled high, waiting to be picked up, which will take well over a month. Out on the farms in the town of Hastings west of I-95, the land was flooded from the St John's River. Hastings is the Potato capital of Florida, they are also know for cabbages they grow for St Patrick's Day in the northeast. Don't know whether they'll make it this year.

Acres and acres are all mud and the farmers cannot get equipment in to make the rows etc. The city of Jacksonville was also flooded. St. Augustine was flooded from the Intracoastal Waterway, dunes were breached, and a house fell in the ocean, all due to the storm surge. We were blessed to have our power back in 24 hours along with water and cable, but cable did not last long. That came back Saturday, September 23rd. The three Bridges to the island were open for traffic Tuesday at noon, after being closed on Sunday.

Storm updates from our classmates:--

Eileen (Harrington) Collomb went to Fleming Island, west of Jacksonville to stay with her niece, along with her brother and other family members. When she returned home, her condo was ok and she had power.

Danny and Bonnie Pushee of Crystal River (on the west coast) did not evacuate. He said with all the preparations, he was very blessed. The town went thru the eye of Irma. Danny said it got so quiet and bright.

Bob and Beverly Armitage of Ft. Myers also rode out Irma. Their condo had no damage. Beverly said when they ventured out it was like a war zone. Power returned Monday only to lose it again. On Tuesday, the food in the freezer was starting to thaw. They had crab cakes, ribs etc. She called the neighbors and said I'll meet you in the Grill area, we can have a potluck supper. Yummy. After five days, the power came on, but no cable. (It is hard having no cable, since you have no news of what is going on.) They enjoyed watching movies. Beverly said that where she was, instead of a storm surge going inland, it was in reverse, it went out into the Gulf. It went way out like a low tide, except that it went out so far, you could walk on the ocean floor. The same thing happened at a

lake nearby where the water was sucked out. Finally, about ten days later on Wednesday, their cable came back on.

Chuck and Joan McCarthy of Davenport rode out the storm. They had lots of downed trees and debris, but their house was ok. Their power was out for six days and came back on Saturday. Joan said the hard part was the heat and humidity. It was up in the nineties all week.

Heard from Beverly (Bell) Collins, said her home and boat in St Croix VI did not experience any damage but did say St. Thomas and St. John were a real mess. Bev did not think she would get lucky with Maria! As of this writing, she has had no communication with anyone regarding her house on the east side.

Linda Patton was having her problems in Tallahassee where Irma was heading. She was preparing to put tarps on all the old 'rare' books, worth thousands of dollars, waiting to go to the A.T. Museum Library, after its renovations are completed next year. Linda was afraid one of her many trees might poke a hole in her roof. Linda lucked out as Irma turned into a Tropical Storm and she had no problems except for a LOT of yard debris. She never lost power and winds were only about 35 miles an hour with occasional wind gust of 50 mph. Linda said it was like ordinary heavy rainstorm and they were exceptionally lucky.

Charley Norton of Bonita Springs FL said they were on the mend and are thankful there was little building damage. He lost a bunch of trees and there was a lot of debris at his condo complex at Bermuda Pointe. The power was out for five days which he said was brutal, no computer, no TV, and especially no air conditioning. Cable was tough too, first picture breaking up, then no audio. Charley said things are returning to normal.

Bob and Charlotte White's home was fine. His neighbor said there was just a lot of debris and many trees were down. They face a golf course and Bob was hoping most of the trees were on the links.

Don and Dottie (Charest '58) Clement's winter home in Vero Beach had no damage.

Carole Simpson, of Largo FL on the west coast, in the Tampa area, and her son who lives nearby both are ok. She went to stay with her sister Joan, in an assisted living facility near her. Carole lost power for five days and also part of her roof. Again many uprooted trees and lots of tree debris.

Betty (Morrison) Butler was glad she made the decision to move from Orlando to MO. She said she never wanted to sit through another Hurricane like Donna.

I was so happy to hear from Grace Elaine (Dusseault) 'Butch' Mongeau. She moved from Naples to GA and is glad that she did.

Our problems are very small compared to people who have lost everything, all over the state of Florida, Houston, Puerto Rico, US and British Virgin Islands. Such devastation and misery! A blast from the past. I needed to get more 80th birthday celebrations. For some mates I don't have their

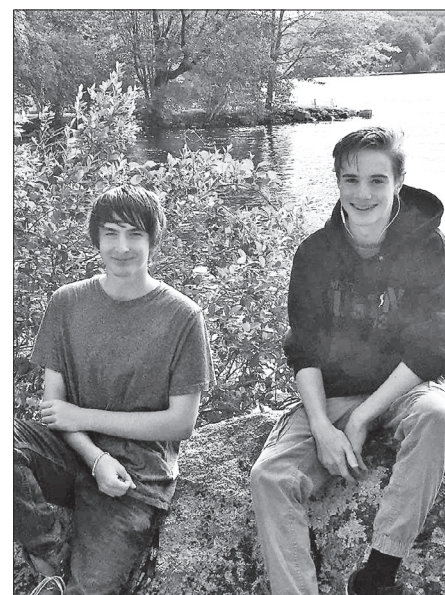

Bruce Costa sends along the following. "Thanks for inviting me to write about our trip to Cuba. Since 2017 marked my 60th trip around the sun, we decided we would travel overseas this year. In addition to Cuba, we've visited Costa Rica, Panama, South America, and Namibia. Next year we are off to South America, a few places further south, and Europe for several months. We like to travel.

On our trip to Cuba, Margie and I immersed ourselves in all things Cuba; including history, people, religion, governance, architecture, and Fidel Castro. We spent some time in Havana and then boarded the M/S Pan Orama II for several more days of exploring the island. If there is one word to describe the relationship between the United States and Cuba, It's "complicated". We heard this word used repeatedly as we traveled around the country talking to Cubans about the relationship between our countries. They love Americans but they are not necessarily enamored with our government. The US Trade Embargo has made life challenging in many ways for them but they have

also found ways to overcome many of the restrictions and move on with life. Regardless of what you might think about the Cuban government and the Castro brothers, the people were warm, friendly, and genuinely interested in seeing and talking to us.

The Spanish founded Havana in 1519 and the urban landscape reflects the colonial, neocolonial, and revolutionary impact of each period. The core of the city, Old Havana, is now a UNESCO Heritage site. The Hotel Nacional de Cuba where we stayed the first three nights of our tour was built in the 1930's and is located on the Malecón. This same hotel hosted the infamous mob summit depicted in the movie *The Godfather Part II*. Many notable writers, actors, and jet setters stayed here and the rooms take you back to a more opulent time when men polished shoes and women primped at the vanity table before heading out for an evening on the town or at the casinos. We took a ride in vintage American cars and visited an auto workshop where inventive mechanics repair cars without American parts. Can you say Bondo? We also visited a cigar factory where cigars are rolled by hand and yes, we brought back Cuban cigars and rum. I checked out the University of Havana where there is no business school. Under a socialist system, why would they teach business?

After three days in Havana, we boarded our motor sailing yacht and set out to explore more of Cuba. Having spent thirteen years in the US Navy and over three years at sea, I still enjoy getting underway and seeing the world under this wonderful mode of conveyance. Our first stop was the Bahia de Cochinos (Bay of Pigs); The Bay of Pigs gained worldwide notoriety in 1961 when a US backed invasion failed. The animosity felt by Castro toward the US government was real and can still be felt at the museum that records

the event that took place from the Cuban perspective. Today the Bay of Pigs is a resort with a hotel on a white sandy beach where you can stay.

Additional stops took us to Cienfuegos to see the smallest humming bird in the world and visit with a group of talented Cuban musicians. Trinidad was our next stop where we visited an old Spanish sugar plantation and colonial city center. From Trinidad, we set sail for the Isla de la Juventud, where Castro was imprisoned at the Presidio Modelo, a prison that was modeled after the prison in Joliet IL. From there we went to Cayo Largo for some snorkeling on the white sandy beach then back to Cienfuegos for a tour of the colonial portion of the city before departing for our flight back to Miami and then on to Missoula the next day.

Throughout our trip, the people were always very hospitable. We never felt we were in any danger, in fact, Cuba has a very low crime rate and we always felt safe walking around the country wherever we went. For those thinking about visiting Cuba, I would encourage you to go, however check the travel restrictions for US citizens before you go since they are always in flux."

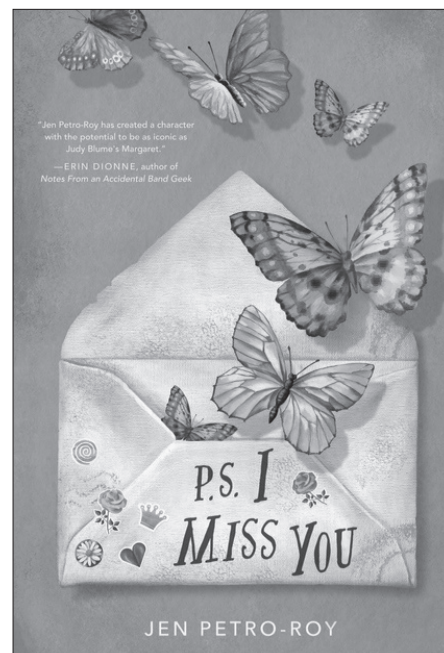

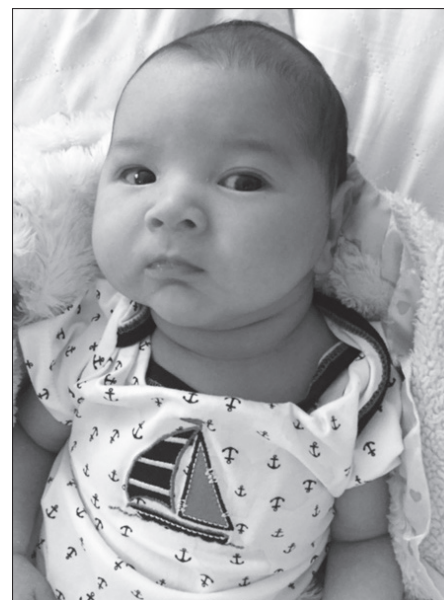
